

Cyprus Agreement Details Outlined In White Paper

LONDON (CP)—The new republic of Cyprus will guarantee Britain continued sovereignty over two military zones and set up safeguards against fighting between Greek and Turkish Cypriots. Partition or union of the island with another country is barred.

These arrangements were outlined Monday in a 5,000-word white paper on the accord reached last week among Britain, Greece, Turkey and representatives of Greek and Turkish Cypriots.

The two areas to remain under full British sovereignty are the Episkopi region in the south and the Pergamos area in the centre of the Mediterranean island. Britain currently has between 30,000 and 35,000 troops on Cyprus, mostly in these areas.

TARGET DATE
The target date for establishment of the republic is Feb. 19, 1960.

It will be governed by a Greek Cypriot president and a Turkish Cypriot vice-president. There is to be a House of Representatives elected by universal suffrage for a period of five years, with members drawn 70 per cent from the Greek Cypriot community and 30 per cent from the Turkish Cypriots.

A separate defence treaty will provide for joint action by Greece and Turkey and the new republic against any aggressor threatening any one of them.

Further provisions call for the new republic to grant most-favored-nation treatment to Britain, Greece and Turkey for all international agreements of any kind. The agreement calls for the immediate establishment of a joint commission to draft a constitution. It will comprise representatives of the Greek and Turkish governments as well as the Greek and Turkish Cypriot communities.

Britain, which has ruled Cyprus for 81 years, will have specified port facilities at Famagusta and use of certain localities for troop training. British air-land without restriction.
