

Busy Session In Alberton Court

ALBERTON — Edgar John Milligan, Brae, and Joseph Denis Arsenault, Duvar were each fined \$50 and costs or 30 days by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald QC, at Alberton yesterday, for driving while their licenses were suspended.

For racing with another vehicle Peter Buote, Tignish, was fined \$50 and costs.

John James Nelligan, Norway, was fined \$75 and costs or two months on his fourth conviction for driving while his license was suspended. In addition, Nelligan was ordered to make a public apology in Court to Tignish Policeman Vincent Bradley for trying to make it appear that the policeman had lied in his evidence. The sentence also included the following conditions: that he enter into a recognizance in the amount of \$500. Keep the peace and be of good behaviour, refrain from alcoholic beverages, not drive a motor vehicle and appear for sentence when called to do so.

Foster Currie and Laurie Shaw, O'Leary received fines of \$25, and costs for causing a disturbance in a public place by fighting.

Erskine Stephen Gavin, Alberton, was fined \$75, and costs for having care and control of a motor vehicle while impaired. A similar charge against Frederick Leonard McElhiney, Alberton South, was withdrawn. McElhiney was represented by Bruce MacDonald.

Under the highway traffic act, fines of \$10 and costs were assessed to Edward Lawrence Gavin, Sea Cow Pond, John Kevin Stewart, West Point, Joseph Manuel Gallant, Alaska and Thomas Goin, O'Leary for operating insufficiently equipped vehicles; Earl Franklyn Adams, Elmisdale, passing on the solid white line; Bruce Alexander Carruthers, Cascumpec, failing to stop at a stop sign; Wilbert Dumville, West Cape, and Melvin Martin, Tignish, driving without due care and attention.

Charges against Everett Joseph Wedge and John Leo Butler, Miminegash, of loitering or prowling on Halloween night were withdrawn. Earl Franklyn Adams, Elmisdale, was fined \$15 and costs for driving without due care and attention. There were ten convictions under the liquor control act.

Former Islander Dies In Winnipeg

ALBERTON — News came to Alberton yesterday morning of the death in Winnipeg of Mrs. H. Waido Mathews, a longtime resident of this Prince County town.

The former Helen Tanton, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Jarvis P. Tanton, was born in Sherbrooke, sixty-seven years ago. After attending Prince of Wales College, she taught school for a few years before her marriage in 1921.

Until her retirement last year she had served as an efficient clerk in Alberton Post Office for more than thirty years.

She was a faithful member of the Anglican church and active in its organizations and Sunday School. She was immediate past president of Alberton Women's Institute.

Last spring she left Alberton for an extended visit with members of her family. For the greater part of the past two months she has been in a Winnipeg hospital where she underwent surgery on two occasions.

Mr. Mathews died in January 1955. Surviving are two sons and one daughter, Keir in Brandon, Manitoba, Jarvis in Arvida, Quebec and Mrs. Ormand Dewell (Bessie) in Seabright, Ontario. There are also a number of grandchildren and the following brothers and sisters, Mrs. Carl Sporie (Isabella) of Redding, Conn.; Bremner of St. Petersburg, Florida; Fulton of Edson, Alberta; Canon Stavert Tanton of Halifax, Frank of Winnipeg and Mrs. Herbert Leavitt (Florence) of Alberton. The funeral will be in Alberton early next week.

Island People Are More Diet Conscious

Prince Edward Island's urban people are either more diet conscious than those in the rest of Canada, or else they have a keener eye for economy. Consumption of skim milk increased by 20 per cent here in the first eight months of the year. It decreased elsewhere in Canada. Consumption of pasteurized milk dropped by one percent here. It increased by that amount in other provinces.

Dairy Superintendent E. W. Adams reported these developments last night to the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Fluid Milk Association, it was held in Birch Court. President Arthur G. MacRae, Brackley Point Road presided.

DR. STERNS — Dr. John Sterns, department of health veterinary officer told the meeting "flavor is the one really important thing you must sell, if you want the teen-agers' dollar in competition with coke, and the rest of the current drinks."

Clean milk, sanitary equipment, and properly cooled milk, are three musts to provide this flavor, he advised.

You can talk all you want about milk being the perfect food... and all the rest of it, but it's flavor you must stress if you are to increase milk consumption Dr. Sterns urged.

FLUID MILK PRODUCERS — There are 145 fluid milk producers—they sell to fluid milk distributing plants—and the average standard is 315 pounds. That's too low, suggested Mr. Adams who suggested milk should be paid for on a quality grade basis, as it is in some other provinces. The association voted to increase membership dues by one dollar per head, in an effort to meet a budget total that put them in the red last year.

President MacRae referred with pride to the fact that the association secretary, J. Lincoln Dewar, is the Maritime advisor to the Canada Dairy Commission, it's headed by S. C. Barry, federal deputy minister of agriculture, who is resigning that post to take on new duties. Mr. Dewar is the only Maritime man named on the advisory committee.

OF INTEREST — Also of interest is the fact that past president Andrew MacRae, Union Road, who attended last night's meeting leaves the first of the year for Moncton, where he will take a position on Canada's manpower commission for the Maritime area.

New directors named included: Peter MacAulay of Souris for Kings County; and five for Queens, Eugene Cullen and William C. Ball, both of Charlottetown; Wallace Wood, Marshfield; Leigh Kennedy, Southport and Perley Taylor, Winsloe. Eugene Cullen was elected president and James Johnstone of Summerside vice-president.

Bedford Merchant Dies Suddenly At Home

Following the completion of his education at Union Commercial College, Charlottetown, he worked on various fox farms in the Prairies.

In 1953 he returned to Prince Edward Island where he and his father went into the grocery business. Following his father's death, he ran the business successfully until he retired in 1960.

He was predeceased by his first wife Helen, along with his mother and father, and two brothers.

Surviving members of his family are: his second wife, Gladys; and four sons by his previous marriage, Glen, Bedford; Howard, Moncton; Clifton, Halifax, and Edwin, Toronto; also one sister, Laura, Mrs. Orion Johnson residing in Cambridge, Mass.

Premier Campbell Addresses Sixth District Of Queens

By LORNE YEO — "If we had a provincial election today, Mrs. Jean MacDonald and Eddy Brown would be elected with a 600 majority in the Sixth District of Queens," said Premier Alex Campbell. They were the defeated Liberal candidates in the last provincial election.

Premier Campbell was speaking to the annual meeting of the Sixth District of Queens Liberal Association last night, where he reviewed the financial situation of the province, spoke on the Ottawa fiscal conference, listed reasons "why Mr. Shaw called an election on May 30," and mentioned the present situation at Georgetown.

REASON FOR ELECTION — One reason for the election, the premier stated, was "to cover up the problem of the Georgetown industries and other enterprises known to him (Opposition leader Walter R. Shaw) to be in financial difficulties."

"The Conservatives now have the audacity to blame these problems on the present government. It is rather curious that criticism of the government's handling of the Georgetown situation has come, not from the leader of the opposition, but from the unofficial opposition critic in the person of Dr. Sinton."

PREMIER WENT ON TO SAY — Premier Campbell went on to say "I find it difficult to understand why he is, led to make such statements, although it is known that he has delivered these statements, in the presence of the man, who once wheeled the Georgetown records into the Legislature in a wheelbarrow, and who now is in the employ of the oil company supplying fuel oil to the trawlers."

Premier Campbell was referring to Leo Rossiter, PC, (Second Kings) former fisheries minister in the Conservative government.

Further in connection with the Georgetown situation, the premier stated: "We can also understand why the candidates of the opposition, enjoying the benefits of sales of food and supplies to the trawlers, would want to preserve the status quo, regardless of the cost of the project to the taxpayers." Here, the premier was referring to McConnell's Shopping Center, Georgetown.

PER CAPITA DEBT — Prince Edward Island's per capita direct debt in 1964 was \$368, in 1965, \$406 and in 1966 it was \$455. "It will be jumping to \$563 per person by 1967," stated Premier Campbell.

The premier was introduced by W.R. Jenkins, president of the P.E.I. Liberal Association, who in turn was introduced by chairman Keith MacKinnon.

Mr. Jenkins told the gathering of Liberal supporters three combinations are required to win an election: "You have to have an outstanding leader, have good candidates and good organization within the party."

OTHER SPEAKERS — Other speakers included, Mrs. Jean MacDonald, Eddy Brown and Addie MacDonald, president of the Queens County Liberal Association. Officers elected were Keith MacKinnon, president; Earl Nicholson, vice-president; Dr. Raymond Grant, secretary treasurer.
