Cigarette-Smoking Machine Fails In Seven-Year Task

TORONTO (CP)—A Toronto cigarette-smoking machine has sworn off temporarily at least after seven years of puffing in a vain attempt to isolate the link between smoking and cancer in the smoke.

But the machine's operator, Prof. C. F. Wright of Toronto's chemistry department, has satisfied himself that cigarette smoking is in the wrong direction.

Wright's findings were discussed in a report on cigarettes and lung cancer released today by the National Cancer Institute of Canada, which financed the research. The report concludes that cigarette smoking is an important cause but not the only cause of lung cancer.

The Wright research found that 16 known cancer-inducing substances isolated from cigarette smoke are not in sufficient quantity to cause the disease themselves.

He also disagrees with a current theory that the guilty agent might be in phenol, a substance found in another chemical department of the smoke.

Ambassador Is Drowned

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP)—Ignoring red flags warning of treacherous seas, Soviet Ambassador Ilya Chervyshev went swimming at exclusive Pinaca Beach and was drowned Sunday.

Valery Yarkov, one of two Soviet Embassy officials who turned back to avenge Chervyshev's cries for help, also went under and was presumed drowned.

Witnesses said the 50-year-old ambassador, considered a strong swimmer, was caught by a high wave and pulled under.

Chervyshev recovered his body. Pearson was a deputy secretary general at the United Nations from 1953 to 1957.

He became ambassador to Brazil last February, following the resumption of diplomatic relations between Brazil and the Soviet Union after a 14-year lapse.

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Oil Co. To Expand In Atlantic Area

Texaco of Canada Limited expects to spend \$20,000,000 in expansion of its facilities in the Atlantic Provinces within the next few years, J.C. Wattle, Montreal, the company's general manager, said in Charlottetown Saturday.

Accompanied by James Brown, district manager of Texaco from Halifax, Mr. Wattle was shown around Texaco facilities by J. David Stewart, local Texaco representative.

Mr. Wattle said he was "impressed with market possibilities in Prince Edward Island, particularly from the standpoint of setting up more distribution outlets. We are looking at market possibilities in connection with the new Texaco refinery now under construction at Eastern Passage, N.S."

He said he expects the new refinery to be in operation late in 1963.

The plant has expanded recently in Charlottetown with the construction of two, million-gallon marine tanks. Mr. Stewart said the tanks will be filled this fall, giving the Texaco depot a capacity of 6,000,000 gallons.

Warheads Are Seen As Issue

BY DAVE MCINTOSH OTTAWA (CP)—If one assumes—and a lot of people here do—that Prime Minister Diefenbaker will call an election before what is his question arises: On what issue might Parliament be dissolved?

Talk, rumor, gossip and speculation here last week indicated one possibility: Acceptance of American nuclear weapons for Canadian forces.

In reply to a Commons question, Mr. Diefenbaker said the government's policy is unchanged "at the moment" from what it was last February. That the nuclear family shouldn't be increased as long as there were any possibility of disarmament.

When pressed by Opposition Leader Pearson on whether any policy change is contemplated, the prime minister said: "I am not going to contemplate the future."

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
