By EDDY GILMORE LONDON (AP) — A duchess stared icily at the tall, blonde, full-bodied woman affixing her signature to a racing form. Two debutantes giggled and a peer of the realm snorted disapproval. "This is preposterous," said a stiff-necked racing official at Royal Ascot. "We've had everything here, but never autograph-seeking. Ascot will never live it down."

Lady Docker, the shocker, was shocking Britain again. Surrounded by a clamoring mob, she was scribbling autographs as fast as she could write "Norah Docker" on anything from a pig-aret package to a racing program. In the seven years she's been married to millionaire Sir Bernard Docker, her ladyship has become a large figure of social controversy.

HER QUOTES ARE NEWSY Highly articulate though in somewhat too strident tones for some sensitive ears—she never seems to stop talking. But unlike many marathons of the spoken word she is highly quotable. A few weeks ago the Dockers encountered what may be the biggest crisis of their lives. Sir Bernard was fired from the chairmanship of the Birmingham Small Arms Corporation, a job he had inherited—along with a fortune— from his father. Lady Docker took the blame. "This has hurt me terribly," she said, "because some people are saying that I have caused this and I've injured my husband." 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3 Freighters Load Cargo In Georgetown

The S. S. Claus Boge, a 1,264 reg. net ton German freighter with a crew of twenty-five men under the command of Captain A. Kessler cleared port at Georgetown harbor Monday, bound for Rotterdam via Summerside where she will take on additional cargo. She took on 1,200 cord of peeled pulp in Georgetown, loaded by a Quigley and Son, St. Peters.

As she sailed out of port the large 6,000-ton German ship M. V. Balkan moved in and docked at the Railway Wharf enroute from Montreal, partly loaded with cargo. She is under command of Captain W. Seids, and has a crew of thirty-eight men. Her port of registry is Hamburg, Germany. Island Produce are the loaders in Georgetown and when she has completed taking her cargo of peeled pulp at Georgetown she will proceed to Mulgrave, N. S. to take on further cargo before proceeding overseas.

This is the third German freighter to load at Georgetown during the past week.

He then travelled to Europe on a horse boat and made his living in London by writing. He has written for world magazines such as Scribners, London Mercury, and many others. He has also written ten books of poetry and one of prose, and has just completed two volumes on Shakespeare.

His "Lyric Year" is considered the finest lyric poetry in America, and it is the only ever published in the author's hand writing since Blake's Day. Other of his books include "Out of the Wilderness", "Plagon of Beauty", "Song of the Undertow", and "Caw Caw Ballads." He has lectured at Yale, Harvard, Bowdoin College, Columbia, and many others.

Mr. MacDonald is married to the former Dorothy Colomy of Maine, and they have one daughter, Ann Meriden, Seventeen.

Mr. MacDonald has travelled from coast to coast across Canada and has written poetry about every Province he had visited. This trip has been well planned for him by Dr. A.J.
