Dairy Products.

MONTREAL, Oct. 28.—Writing on Canadian produce, Hodgson Bros., under date of Liverpool October 15th, says: "Cheese has only been in moderate demand all week, but prices of fancy qualities, latest make, rule firm. We quote finest colored August, Canadian, 43s to 44s; white 42s to 43s; choicest states colored and white, 42s to 43s. Earlier markers are in request from 35s to 40s; while low grades (so plentiful), are dull from 20s to 30s per cwt."

"Butter—A further advance in quotations of continental produce has taken place, but dealers are slow to follow, and only operate for immediate needs. Finest made Canadian is in fair demand, but supplies of this quality are small, bulk of stock being a secondary grade. We quote: Fancy fresh-made Canadian creamery, in boxes, 96s to 100s—next quality from 90s to 94s; finest states, 92s to 95s. Finest ladies and imitations in fair demand from 66s to 76s; finest Danish 108s to 118s. Irish creamery, 105s to 112s; Cork firsts 91s; seconds, 85s; thirds, 78s per cwt."

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Oct 28.—Hon Mr Sifton's puffery bureau in this city, it appears, was suggested to him by a gentleman in Manitoba who for some years was connected with the English department of Bismarck's public opinion bureau in Berlin, of which full particulars are given in Bush's life of Bismarck.

As the ministers have important engagements in Ottawa next week, they have secured a postponement of the Washington conference to November 10th.

A hitch was occurred in connection with the winter mail contract. The Allans want certain clauses modified but Sir Richard Cartwright will not give way, accordingly all steamship men left for Montreal to talk over the matter with their principals.

Trading in Rifles.

OTTAWA, Oct. 28.—A curious story is afloat in connection with the sale of Snider rifles, tenders for which were received a few weeks ago. Col. Cole, commanding officer of the Second Montreal Regiment Artillery, was the highest bidder, and thousand stand of Sniders were sold to him at 80 cents each, together with a large quantity of ammunition, of which the department had some six million rounds on hand. Col. Cole is now retailing Sniders at \$5 each, so that he stands to make a good thing out of his venture.

Interesting Event.

MONTREAL, October 28.—Collingwood Schreiber, chief engineer of railways and canals, is to wed Miss Gwynne, daughter of Mr Justice Gwynne, of the supreme court. The marriage takes place next month.

FRANCE WARNED.

Cecil Rhodes on the Situation.

LONDON, Oct 28.—The Cape Town correspondent of the Times says: "Mr. Cecil Rhodes, addressing an open air meeting here said that four years ago he saw Baron de Courcel (French Ambassador to Great Britain), and told him on the authority of Lord Rosebery that Great Britain would fight if necessary to prevent the French reaching the Nile and cutting the connection the British intended to make between the north and south."

"Mr. Rhodes added that he knew the French Government was then advised that such would be England's action."

THE DREYFUS CASE.

Some Sensational Developments.

PARIS, Oct. 28.—The Dreyfus court of enquiry was of a lively character yesterday.

Great stress was laid by M Bardoncot on Picquart's letter of July 14, 1898, to the minister of justice, in which he gave seven principal arguments against the probability of the guilt of Dreyfus, including the impossibility of Dreyfus procuring the plans of fortresses and proposals for the movements of troops undetected, whereas Major Esterdazy had free access thereto.

This letter also cites interviews which Col. Picquart had with Gens. Billot and Gonze, and says:

"With the proof in my hands I have established the innocence of Dreyfus."

To this General Gonze replied, according to the letter of the minister of justice, "What is it to you if Dreyfus is on Devil's Island?"

Col. Picquart—"But he is innocent."

Gen. Gonze—"You know Mercier (former minister of war), and Saussier (former military governor of Paris) are mixed up in this affair. Do you want to compromise them?"

The letter then continued that on leaving Gen. Gonze, Col. Picquart declared he was convinced of the innocence of Dreyfus, and he prepared to fight the matter out and reveal what he knew.

After further reference to Col Picquart's charges that the ministry of war and general staff had tampered with documents and had manufactured evidence in the Dreyfus case, and a presentation of the contradictory statements of Col. Picquart and the minister of war relative to the secret document.

The sensational part of M. Bard's report was the shorthand notes of the examination of the late Lieut. Colonel Henry, by M. Godefroy Cavaignac, the minister of war, after Henry's forgery had been discovered. These notes showed that the confession of forgery was only obtained with the utmost difficulty, Henry stoutly denying, and then prevaricating to the effect that he only added a phrase to the genuine letter, and then, when driven to the last corner, protested that he acted for the country's good.

The draft of M. Bard's conclusions was that Comte Esterhazy was the real culprit, but that his condemnation would have meant the ruin of the Intelligence department.

M. Bard announced severely on the withholding of the secret dossier from Dreyfus himself, as the presenting of the documents to Dreyfus could not have compromised the national interests, he said, and the course adopted was in flagrant violation of the rights of French citizens since 1789.

Although the proceedings, thus far, are so favorable to Dreyfus, it must not be assumed that there will be any real clearing up of the mystery. It looks, rather, as though an attempt is being made to stifle the real truth by liberating Dreyfus without a new trial.

It is asked by the Dreyfusites if the secret dossier exists as alleged, what good purpose can be served by the cassation giving a decision without seeing it, since that is the only real proof, if any, of the guilt of Dreyfus.
