Fall Start Scheduled On Slemon Park Homes

OTTAWA — Work on laying the foundations for the 100 new homes to be built for RCMP personnel at Slemon Park near Summerside will commence this fall, Solicitor General J. Watson MacNaught said in Ottawa Wednesday.
 He was commenting on statements attributed last week to P.E.I. Provincial cabinet members Hubert McNell and Henry Wedge who visited Ottawa on government business. They indicated that no start would be made this year on the first 100 homes at Slemon Park.
 "I have received every assurance from both the department of national defence and from Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation that the work on the foundations will start this year and that work on the houses will be commenced during the winter months," Mr. MacNaught said.
 He said he had been surprised at the report from the provincial ministers about any delay and on checking with the defence department and CMHC he said he had been unable to find anyone who had given out such information to Mr. Wedge or Dr. McNell.
 There are 365 housing units in Slemon Park now and Mr. MacNaught announced last in August that a decision had been taken to build another 175 units there with the first 100 started as soon as possible.

Emphasis Change Made By Council

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canada Council announced today it is placing more emphasis on fellowships for advanced studies and in future will require work to be done within Canada as far as possible.
 Issuing its scholarship and fellowship program for 1964-65, the council estimated some 2,200 candidates will apply for approximately 500 awards worth about \$1,000,000.
 Major change is a shift toward more awards for students working for doctor's degrees with less emphasis at a more junior level.
 Last year the council awarded approximately 150 pre-doctoral degree fellowships and 60 pre-master's degree scholarships. This year a total of some 250 acting as choir and glee club director.
 Mr. Gaudet, a noted musician who will receive his degree in music during the coming year, along with his MA, degree in education, from St. Dunstan's University. His new duties also include

post-graduate awards are set clear late Wednesday evening.

The council's program says the change in emphasis is due to the steadily growing demand at the pre-doctoral level and because sources of financial assistance now are proportionately more plentiful at the pre-master's level.
