Now she said, she was returning with her husband to find their son, their home and their business wiped out in the devastating flames of a fire which leveled much of the main business district of the town.

The Magdalene Islands are only about 100 miles north of Charlottetown, but are not as well known to Prince Edward Islanders, as Charlottetown is to residents of the other Islands who land first in Charlottetown on a flight to any other point away from their home Islands.

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MOLASSES GINGER COOKIES

THIS IS AN ICE BOX RECIPE!

Don't worry if they disappear like magic. This is an ice-box recipe. Make a big, big batch of dough, roll it in wax paper and keep it in your refrigerator. Then bake 'em as you need 'em. Yes, Easy-Does-It with these new molasses ginger cookies.

EASY-DOES-IT MOLASSES COOKIES CAN ICE-BOX RECIPE!

1 tsp. ginger
1 tsp. salt
3 cups flour

One cup shortening
2/3 cup Crosby's Molasses
1/3 cup brown sugar
2 tsp. soda

Blend shortening, sugar and molasses. (For best results be sure to use Crosby's Pure Barbados Molasses. Barbados is excellent for sugar content.) Add dry ingredients and mix thoroughly. Shape into roll (approximately 1 1/2" diameter) in wax paper. Store in refrigerator until chilled. As required, slice very thin and place on greased cookie sheet. Bake 8 minutes in a 365° oven.

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
