The C. F. A. Meets On June 20th, after meeting for two days, the C. F. A. directors and delegates presented a statement covering the position of Canadian agriculture to the Hon. James G. Gardiner. The submission is too lengthy to publish in its entirety and we will attempt to summarize it's more important features.

It was emphasized that Canadian agriculture is being faced with more and more difficulty in finding export markets for surplus production and were it not for some fairly satisfactory price supports now in effect, the position of many producers would be tragically serious.

It was pointed out that the drop in the cost of living, hailed with satisfaction by the consumer and acclaimed by some responsible cabinet ministers is in reality the result of lower prices for farm products and this in the face of increasing farm costs.

It was commending the steps which have been taken to deal with the various emergencies which have arisen in the livestock industry, it was suggested that too often stop-gap solutions for emergency are not as satisfactory as long-range planning to insure adequate markets and reasonable returns.

In making specific recommendations it was asked that Canadian agriculture be recognized as an essential defence industry and that appropriations be made from defence funds to finance the stockpiling of food and the movement of surpluses where required.

Meat Support No demand was forthcoming for any increase in floor prices on either pork or beef, the floor prices were held to be satisfactory in the face of great difficulties in finding markets for surplus production.

The present floor price for hogs will continue at least until September 30th and on beef while the U. S. embargo remains in effect, although not necessarily at present price levels.

At the present time, the Dominion Government owns 30 million pounds of canned pork and has also a liability for 45 million pounds in domestic cuts and Wilshire sides. This in itself gives some idea of what could have happened with hogs, were it not for government intervention.

The Poultry Industry A definite request was made for the placing of floor prices on poultry meat, the suggested levels being as follows:

Chicken—Grade A Over 5 lbs. 38 cents 1/2 to 5 lbs. 34 cents Under 3 1/2 lbs. 31 cents

Fowl Over 5 lbs. 27 cents 4 to 5 lbs. 25 cents Under 4 lbs. 22 cents

Turkeys—Grade A Under 18 lbs. 39 cents 18 lbs. and up 32 cents

Dairy Products In 1951 over 50 thousand head of Canadian cattle were exported to the U. S. a movement which has of course ceased entirely, for the present, resulting in increased milk production.

Butter in stock on June 1st was over 25 million lbs. as compared with 16 million a year ago. This increase is not alarming when it is considered that 17 million pounds were imported during the past season and that consumption of butter has been going up steadily so far this year to the tune of 3 million pounds in the first five months of the year.

The holding of 25 million pounds which is only a month's requirements can hardly be considered a serious surplus. Cheese production has been going down and the Hon. Mr. Gardiner was of the opinion that with some effort in a merchandising way that Canadian surplus could be all the production and at higher prices than obtainable in any export markets he knew of.

Slight Decline In Egg Production

Egg production on P. E. I. is showing a slight seasonal decline, reports Mr. F. M. Nash, district inspector, Poultry Products. Demand is strong on 'top grades. General quality is fair. A formula for high quality summer eggs is a holding temperature of not over 60 degrees F. and a high humidity of about 80 degrees. These are not difficult or expensive conditions in P. E. I. egg rooms, either on the farm or in the grading station. Selling twice a week is mighty important too.

Prices have advanced on top grades and dealers are now quoting for ungraded eggs delivered AL 42, AM 40, B 20, C 15, and quoting for graded pack delivered AL 50, AM 48, B 26, C 20. Wholesale to retail AL 53, AM 51, B 30, C 23. There is quite a noticeable spread in retail to consumer prices but this will adjust as soon as supplies purchased before price advance are disposed of. Eggs are at present retailed at AL 55.

62, AM 53-59, B 39-40. There is very little activity as yet in the poultry market. Prices are unchanged. This hatchery season is now completed. Most hatcheries have now placed their last sets and the majority have ceased operations altogether.
