

**Local and Other Items.**

**HALF-MAST.**—The Flag of the Sons of Temperance is flying at half-mast in memory of the late John Scott, Past Grand Scribe.

**SHOE FACTORY.**—Fredericton, N. B., is to have a shoe factory. The sum of \$30,000 has been subscribed, and the city council has passed a resolution to subscribe \$10,000.

**S. E. EXCURSION.**—On Monday next the Sons of England will hold their annual picnic. The Jacques Cartier will leave here at 9 a. m. for Crapaud, returning at 5 p. m.

**ASSISTANCE WANTED.**—The town of Pugwash has issued an appeal, through the Halifax and St. John newspapers, for assistance to the sufferers by the late fire. It is now stated that 40 buildings were consumed, 18 of which were dwelling houses, and there are consequently a number of people destitute.

**THEY MADE A MISTAKE.**—A Holyoke teacher who has been studying manual training in Sweden at a point where the cars run only twice a week, recently received a letter from home in a "flag" envelope, which the authorities thought to be a communication from the U. S. government, on account of the flag. Immediately a special train was made up and took the letter 40 miles for the benefit of the recipient.

**THE SCOTCH GATHERING.**—The gathering of the Clans at Head of St. Peter's Bay on the 17th of August, promises to be the largest gathering of the season. **CONSULTED A DOCTOR.**—A valuable bird dog belonging to Mr. Modie Mitchell of New Portland, Me., was badly cut, by accident, on the leg, recently. The animal disappeared for a while, later going to the house of the only physician in town, where he whined piteously. The doctor examined his leg and sent a boy to Mr. Mitchell, asking if he would like it sewed up. Mr. Mitchell said no, not knowing the extent of the injury. The dog was sent home, but soon returned and would not be comforted till the doctor, taking pity on him, sewed up the wound.

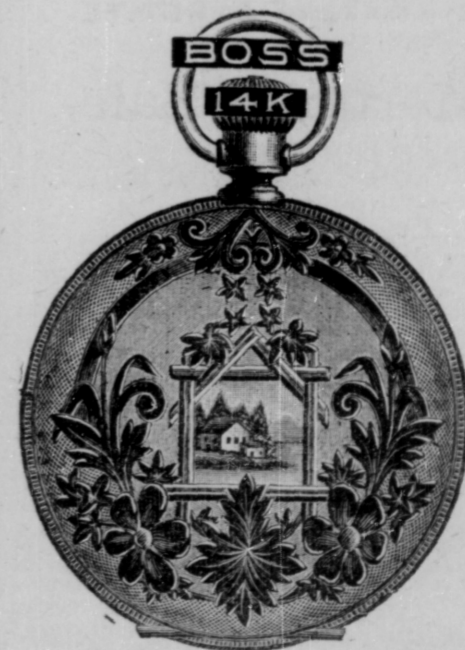

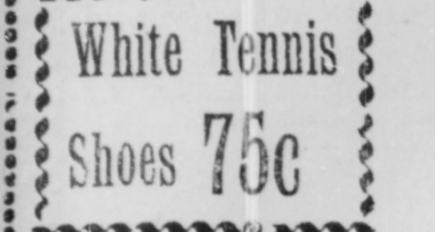
