German Jews Secretly Emigrate to Israel

Bonn, Germany (AP)—The Jews in Germany, an estimated minority of 500,000, are small in number and influence. The future of their community is in doubt. The younger generation shows an inclination to leave for Israel. This is the heritage of Adolf Hitler's "final solution to the Jewish problem."

Eighteen years after the Second World War, only 25,000 Jews are registered with synagogues in West Germany and West Berlin. An estimated additional 7,000 to 8,000 men, women and children of Jewish ancestry have no contact with Jewish religious and community life. About 1,500 practicing Jews are in Communist East Germany.

"We are unimportant quantitatively and qualitatively," says Alexander Ginzburg, joint chairman of the Jewish community in Cologne. "There are scarcely any Jews in Germany today holding influential positions."

MAJOR CENTRE Cologne, population 800,000, is one of the major Jewish centres in Europe. In 1933 the number was 18,500. Ninety per cent of the Jews live in big cities. Half are more than 50 years old. A quarter of the total group lives on government pensions. The third who are employable occupy mostly routine, low-paid jobs or run small businesses.

Synagogue attendance is less than in the prewar period. Only 10 to 20 per cent of the Jews in West Germany eat kosher food. Young people must obtain the official approval of patriarchal authority of their fathers. Before Hitler some of Germany's leading men in government, business, science and the arts were Jews. Among the famous were physicist Albert Einstein, theatre director Walter Hasencamp, banker Solomon Reinheimer, composer Kurt Weill.

Today's most prominent Jew is probably Ludwig Rosenberg, chairman of the German Trade Union Federation. Other names include a Hamburg senator, Herbert Weichmann, and philosopher Ernst Bloch.
