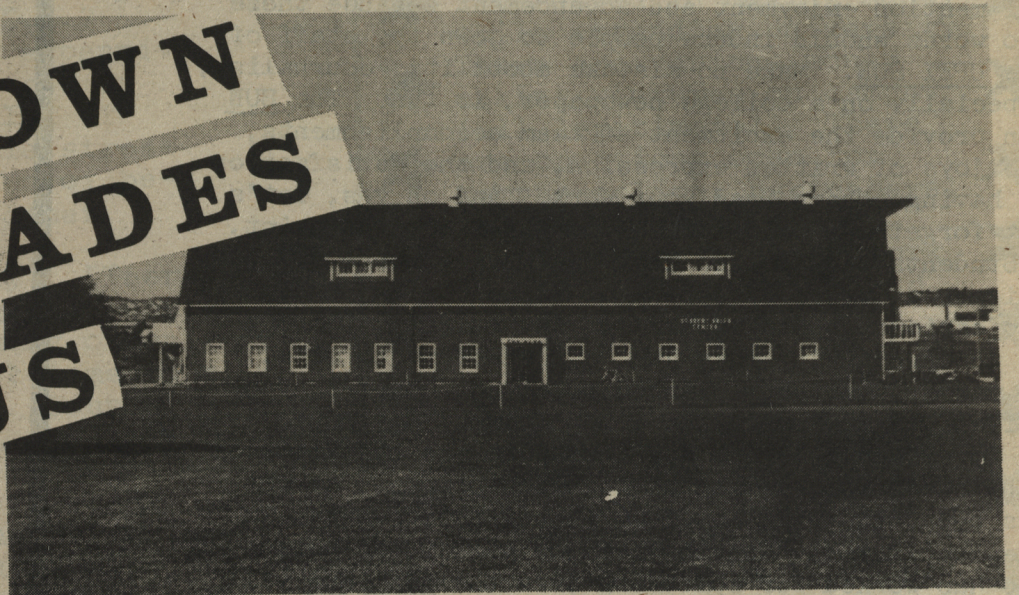


# THE UPEI SUN
