Annual Meeting Of Local Free Dispensary

Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan was again re-elected President of the Charlottetown Free Dispensary at the poorly attended annual meeting of the Dispensary held last night at the Charlottetown. Only the executive members were present.

Mr. C. H. Black was re-elected vice-president and Mrs. Percy MacNeil was appointed secretary. Treasurer replacing Mrs. Harry Tidmarsh. Mrs. Tidmarsh was appointed to the executive.

Other executive members are: Mrs. Lorne Noonan, Mrs. D. J. Riley, Mrs. W. J. P. MacMillan, Mrs. A. K. MacPhee, Mrs. H. F. MacNeil, Mrs. Blythe Murray, Mrs. Lois Brown, Mrs. Blois Andrew, Mrs. R. T. White, Mrs. R. Gordon White, Mrs. J. B. Murley, Mrs. J. A. MacMillan, Major T. E. MacNutt and Mrs. Leo Doucette.

Highlight of the meeting was a report of the Dispensary Nurse, Miss Dorothy Goldie, R.N. The report gave an account of the charitable work carried out by the Dispensary during the year.

The secretary, Mrs. Tidmarsh read the financial statement which showed that there was \$490.94 cash in the bank. Receipts for the year totalled \$2,922.18 and expenditures \$2,501.24.

Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan noted with regret that the spirit of the times is changing so that no one wishes to accept responsibility.

He reviewed the history of the Dispensary from its beginning over 40 years ago as an anti-tuberculosis society stating that it was the first society he joined in this City.

He recalled that one of the duties of the society was the enforcing of meat inspection and in relation to the meat situation at present, one of the great problems of the Island is the lack of an abattoir. The people can not get beef killed at Packing houses here, he said, and they need another one.

Major MacNutt reporting on the results of canvassers stated that they had taken in over \$500 and expect to realize about \$650 or \$700. There are 18 men collecting and it is expected that they will wind up their operations today.

Major MacNutt moved that the sympathy of the meeting be sent to Mr. W. E. Bentley and that Earle be buried on the recent death of Bentley. The motion was seconded by Mr. C. H. Black.

Nurse's Report "The Charlottetown Free Dispensary, starting as a Tuberculosis Society over forty years ago, is believed one of the oldest Charities of its kind in our City," stated Miss Goldie. "Whether it will continue to exist depends very much on public interest and generosity. Each year we have a small grant from the City and Provincial Government. This year the Government increased its grant, which was a great help, coming at a time when most needed."

Flood Waters Continue Steady Drop In Winnipeg

WINNIPEG, May 25 — (CP) — The threat of further flood disaster was lifted today from twin cities as flood waters in St. Boniface, Man.

D.M. Stephens, top Government expert on the Red River, said flatly: "Greater Winnipeg now is out of danger as far as wholesale evacuation is concerned."

Last week-end the Red hit a century-high peak of 39.3 feet. At 4:50 P.M. C.D.T. today it had dropped to 28.2 feet and its rate of fall seemed to be increasing gradually. The drop from 7 A.M. was three inches, equivalent to eight inches a day.

The Dominion Weather Office said tonight it could not see "any significant precipitation" during the next few days.

On the home front, the people of Winnipeg and St. Boniface, who little more than a week ago were piling sandbags frantically, went about their usual business. These flooded out waited impatiently for municipal clean-up squads to go into action. Provincial authorities said they cannot return until decontamination has been carried out, electrical circuits tested and sewers and plumbing facilities inspected.

The army last night declared habitable almost a quarter of the city.

Opening Night Of Carnival For Flood Relief

The opening night's gate of the annual carnival of the Charlottetown Kinsmen Club will go to the National Kinsmen Manitoba Flood Relief Fund, it was voted at the regular bi-monthly meeting of the club held at the Charlottetown Hotel last night. The donation, it is understood, will be at least amount to one hundred dollars.

The meeting, presided over by chairman Willey Bryanton and Percy MacDonald, heard reports on the Kinsmen Carnival and baseball activities. President Dr. L. I. Duffy spoke on the district convention held last week at Amherst and further reports were given by delegates Maurice Redmond, Robert Bradley, Fremont Archer and Percy MacDonald. District Governor Walthen Gaudet gave a short talk on Kinsmanship.

Miss Goldie reported that last Spring financial collections reached over \$1,300, and was the most successful one to date. If an objective of at least \$3,000 could be reached, then much-needed coal and groceries could be given out next winter. The drug bill is very high and uses up almost all of the next year's collection money. 300 doctors' prescription slips were sent to the different drug stores, 74 of these being new ones, and the remainder refills. In addition, a great deal of cod-liver-oil, medicines, etc., were provided, when needed.

Last March there were 99 names on file on the Dispensary's index cards. Of these twenty-eight were widows. The report related the numerous types of cases, also the details of Christmas donations which were acted considerably by a cheque for \$150 from the Rotary Club.

"We gave out seventy-five dinners, boxed, and fifty large bags for families with children," the report states. "Most of these were delivered directly to the people's homes, while the rest were called for. Our boxes of dinners included, chicken, canned goods, fruit, vegetables, tea or coffee, rice, candy, etc., also a pound of sausages for the larger families. The large shopping bags for the children contained, mitts, stockings, fruit, toys, candy, books, and other things of interest to children. The bill for our poultry was over one hundred and twenty dollars. Our stockings, which are usually strong, warm, woolen ones, cost in the vicinity of one hundred dollars. One of our kind well-known business men donated the sausages as well as a generous sum of money and canned goods. All our needy families seemed pleased and satisfied. There were no complaints."

Mr. Evans stated that the audience in attendance was the largest he had spoken to in his many visits to groups interested in home planning. The evenings are part of a Dominion-wide program, and are sponsored by the Veterans' Land and Office.

Using a table size model which illustrated very clearly all points of his discussion, Mr. Evans demonstrated the long term planning of a half acre property. Starting with the placing of the house, additional pieces were placed on the table until the entire half acre was filled. These included driveway, placing of sidewalk, shade trees, foundation planting, sitting area and agricultural area.

Mr. Evans stated that the future of the home rests upon the young generation and upon the investment of the top six inches of soil. During his discussion he touched upon the selection of foundation plants according to location upon the property, and the selection and planting of dwarf fruit trees.

A short talk on the making of a lawn was given by Mr. John Eyrne, who is a native of Sours, P. E. I. Mr. Eyrne stated that it is almost too late now to prepare a good lawn, but pointed out the various steps in its preparation for the one who might be interested at some future date. He recommended a thorough preparation of the ground, and explained the use of stakes and lines for determining the grading of the lawn. He also recommended various types of seeds which could be mixed to obtain an excellent lawn.

Many questions were asked of the two speakers by those present, and after answering, Mr. Eyrne suggested that those with personal problems leave their names with him and he would endeavor to see each one personally during his short stay on the Island.

On motion of Hon. F. A. Large, Minister of Education a vote of thanks was tendered to the speakers for their interesting and enlightening demonstrations.

Biggest Geological Survey Program

OTTAWA, May 25 — (CP) — Canada this year is launching the biggest geological survey program in her history.

A total of 83 parties have been assigned for field work that will include surveys in all 10 Provinces, the Mines Department announced today.

The biggest effort will be made in B.C., where 13 parties have been assigned. Another 12 will work in the Northwest Territories, six in the Yukon, 10 in Alberta and eight in Ontario. The number of parties assigned to work in other Provinces are: Saskatchewan, 5; Manitoba, 7; Quebec, 3; Quebec-Labrador, 3; Newfoundland, 4; New Brunswick, 3; Nova Scotia, 6; and Prince Edward Island, 1.

One party has been assigned to general radioactive mineral investigation and one to airborne magnetometer surveys.

The program by regions: New Brunswick: Glacial geology of the Edmundston area will be mapped and detailed mapping will be done in the Millville and Nipisiquit Falls areas.

Nova Scotia: Investigations will be made into coal deposits in the Sydney, Springhill and Truro districts. Deposits of industrial minerals in the Wolfville region will be mapped.

Prince Edward Island: Ground water surveys will be undertaken in various parts of the Province.
