Annual Meeting At O'Leary Of P.E.I. Credit Union League

Every Credit Union in the Province will be advised to keep at least 20 percent of its assets in a liquid condition under the terms of a resolution passed at the fourteenth annual meeting of the P. E. I. Credit Union League, Ltd., held at O'Leary yesterday.

Other resolutions passed at the meeting expressed approval of the work of the Federation of Agriculture and favored further organization under this body; recommended further promotion of radio forum groups; urged members to secure protection under C. U.N.A. loan protection insurance; and boards of directors to study C.U.N.A. life insurance with a view to recommending this service to individual members; expressed appreciation to the Extension Department of St. Dunstan's University and thanks to the press.

One new director, Mr. Ernest Hughes, was elected for Queens County and two directors were re-elected in the persons of Louis MacGuire for King's County and Melvin Bridges for Prince.

The meeting opened at 11 a. m. with President Cyrus Poirier presiding and welcoming the delegates.

In his report the president stated that the year had been a very successful one and that the Credit Union assets had increased by over \$74,000, and savings by over \$70,000. During the year the Association had appointed a field man, Mr. Joseph MacIsaac, to organize study clubs and promote Credit Union Work. He urged that a strong attempt be made to increase membership.

Mr. J. G. Dennis managing director presented a detailed report of the past year's business. He said he was delighted to be having an annual meeting in O'Leary which is his home town and also the home of the first co-operative organization in the province to pass the half million mark in sales. Mr. Dennis also presented the financial statements and the proposed budget for 1951-52.

The special speaker of the afternoon session was Rev. Father McCormack of St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, N. S. Dr. McCormack spoke of the amazing growth of the Credit Union Movement all across Canada and compared the western Canada Credit Societies with Maritime Credit Unions. He asked that consideration be given to setting up a National Credit Society.

Cites Figures
Mr. Dennis, in his report stated that the credit unions had, for the year ending September 30, 1950, \$74,000. Assets increased from \$770,000, from September 30, 1949 to \$884,000 on September 30, 1950.

Total loans made to 3,094 borrowers during the year amounted to approximately \$455,000 or an average of \$157.00 per borrower.

This, the fourteenth annual report of the League, shows us with

total loans of credit unions since inception, of over \$3,000,000. The Guaranty Fund shows a balance of over \$28,000 to cover uncollectable loans, with an Educational Fund of \$2,854 unexpended as of September 30, 1950.

Commenting on the above figures, Mr. Dennis remarked: "that the above statistics do show progress but not at all the progress that you delegates know we could be making so far as savings are concerned. With a membership of nearly 10,000 members we should have an increase in savings of at least \$250,000 which would be an average saving of \$25.00 per member. There is absolutely no reason why our savings should not be increased each year by this amount if the members of our local credit unions were conscious of the benefits to be obtained by increased savings."

Reference was also made to the League's Share and Loan Department the total assets of which amount to \$114,405.69.

Of this amount \$65,725.22 is invested in the Credit Union and Co-op Building at Charlottetown. There is however, a mortgage of \$30,000 on this building which leaves an investment by the credit unions in this building of \$35,725.22. The revenue from the building is at present more than sufficient to cover the operating costs of the building including interest, insurance, and taxes, with approximately \$2,000 remaining. A ten year lease of this building to the Central Farmers Co-operative Association Limited with the privilege to buy at any time is negotiated.

Book Commended
Commenting on Dr. J. T. Croteau's book, Mr. Dennis said: "A noteworthy contribution was made this year to the credit union movement in this province by Dr. J. T. Croteau, former Managing Director of our League. Dr. Croteau's book 'Cradled in the Waves' is a vivid description of his experiences during the thirteen years he was with us, and no doubt his

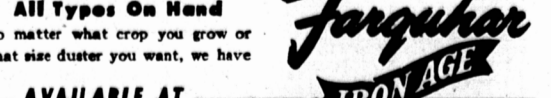
