

# NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

## EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Aug. 26.

At a meeting of the Land League at Cork yesterday the "Juno" affair was condemned and belief expressed that the raid must have been effected by persons desirous to see a renewal of the Coercion Act, and wishing to give the Government good value for their secret service money.

A serious faction fight occurred yesterday at Port Adown, County Armagh, between Catholics and Orangemen. Many persons were badly wounded. The Catholics were routed.

Catholic demonstrations were made in various parts of Ireland yesterday in connection with the fifteenth of August (Lady Day) celebration. At Dungannon the demonstration was attended with serious rioting. The police, who had been seriously stoned, fired upon the procession, killing one man and wounding twenty others. There was also rioting in other parts of the country and several police were injured.

JAGDALAK, Aug. 15.

General Stewart's force has reached Schababa, in the Ghilzai country. The Ameer will enter Bala-Hissar in state today. Cabul is quiet.

CANDAHAR, Aug. 16.

The irregulars occupy the neighboring villages. Ayoub Khan has brought a few guns to bear on the city, but they are too far away to do much damage. About 8,000 Afghans have been expelled from the city. The garrison is well provisioned except with fresh meat. Rumors of General Roberts' advance have reached Candahar.

LONDON, Aug. 16.

A Calcutta despatch says it is almost the universal opinion in India that the action of the Government in simultaneously evacuating Cabul and sending Gen. Roberts on his hazardous march to Candahar is unwise and rash in the extreme.

LONDON, Aug. 16.

Sothern, the actor, is very ill at Brighton. A Paris despatch says the report of the death of Marshal Bazaine is unfounded. Letters have been received which state he is enjoying excellent health.

CALCUTTA, Aug. 16.

The man who fired at Lord Lytton in Calcutta in December, and was then found to be insane, has recovered and been committed for trial.

## UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.

The Evening News says the workmen of the Long Beach and Rockaway Improvement Companies are still unpaid and suffering from want of money.

DETROIT, Aug. 16.

The local steamboat inspectors, as the result of the investigation into the recent collision of the steamboat "Garland" with the steam yacht "Minnie," have revoked the licenses of both captains on the ground that it was entirely within their power to have prevented the terrible accident, by the exercise of any sort of prudence in the management of their respective boats.

LOUISVILLE, Aug. 16.

A telegram to the Courier Journal from Shepherdville says Hon. J. Proctor Knott was shot and mortally wounded this morning, at Mount Washington, ten miles from here, by J. W. Lewis, the Greenback candidate for Congress in that district. No particulars, and great excitement. The Courier Journal does not believe the report true.

## CONDENSED DESPACHES.

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.

The New York Times says that Miss Neilson's death was doubtless from heart disease.

An unwonted sensation was caused at Berlin by a telegram from Paris, summarizing a letter by Gambetta to a Councillor General, published in the Verite. It is generally disbelieved. Nevertheless it is thought by some to express Gambetta's thoughts and has produced a painful impression.

The Paris Republique Francaise announces that Gambetta's letter published in the Verite yesterday, was written on the 16th October, 1871, when it appeared in the Paris newspapers, and was also published in pamphlet form.

The final meeting of the Dublin Mansion House relief committee was held on Saturday last. It was stated that £2,814 remain in hand, which will be reserved for special distribution.
