

Maj.-Gen. Rockingham Does Not Expect Atomic War

CAMP GAGETOWN, N. B., (CP)—Maj.-Gen. John Rockingham says he firmly believes there will not be an atomic war.

At the same time, the chief of the 1st Canadian Infantry Division says the atomic bomb is a practical tactical weapon and Canadian troops must know how to take counter-measures against its possible use.

Gen. Rockingham made these comments here Saturday night a few hours before his division kicked off on Exercise Rising Star, first divisional peacetime manoeuvres in Canadian history. More than 10,000 troops are involved.

HELICOPTERS IMPORTANT

He said he foresees a time when paratroopers will no longer be required in the army. Such troops would be lifted by helicopter. Because helicopters could hover, there would be little danger to them from fast jets. But there would still be a big danger from ground fire.

SOME LESSONS LEARNED

Gen. Rockingham said several lessons have already been learned from these "highly successful" and "amazingly good" exercises at company, battalion and brigade level.

above ground. However, a successful defensive war could not be fought if everyone were dug in or if troops were too dispersed. A tremendous amount of serious thought and study was being given to the problem of dispersal.

FRONT LINES SAFEST

Gen. Rockingham, talking to reporters near his camouflaged farmhouse beside an abandoned railway, said he feels no country is prepared to undertake atomic war, because of the ghastly consequences, especially for cities and civilian populations. In an atomic war, the front-line soldier might be in the safest position because the enemy would not use A-bombs if at close quarters with opposing forces.

Gen. Rockingham said the army has formed a pattern against atomic attack but that much study still has to be given to the problem.

YEARLY EXERCISES

The general said the intention is to hold such divisional exercises every year. The new 427-square-mile camp besides moving troops into battle, he said, helicopters are useful in moving supplies forward and in evacuating casualties. He recalled that during the time he was

commander of the 25th Brigade in Korea, only four of the some 1,500 Canadians wounded in battle died of their wounds. This could be attributed to the Canadian medical corps and to rapid evacuation of casualties to hospital by helicopter.

No detail has been omitted in planning Rising Star. Supposed border incidents between the Philistines and the Buelanders, such as a moose hunt which turned into a boundary spying, a bombed farmhouse and a plane shot down, are set down carefully as causes leading to the outbreak of hostilities.

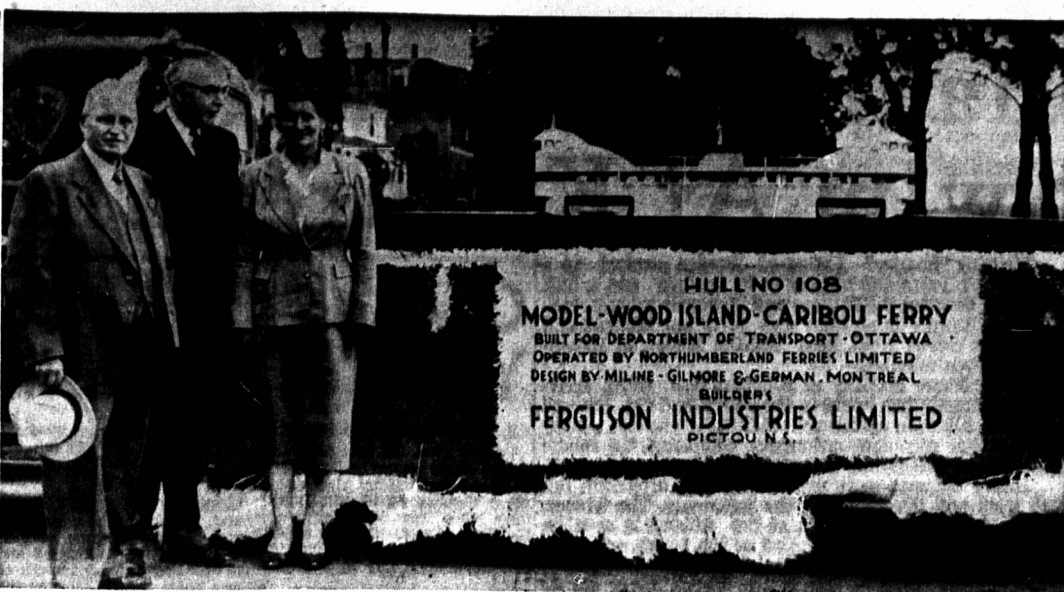
"IGHT 'GEN. GOLIATH"

Most of the division will be fighting to repel the "25th Philistine Corps" under "Gen. Goliath." Some 50 naval planes will take part in the exercise. A heavy rain was falling as the troops finished taking up their defensive positions. Many precautions have been taken, such as defining carefully the difference between exercise signals and those which might be real in case of accident. Bayonets will not be fixed. Rifle blanks are not to be fired at ranges under 20 yards.

Maj.-Gen. Edward Plow, chief of Eastern Command and exercise director, said that if one were sure that any future war would be fought with atomic weapons it would make army planning simpler.

NO PARADROPS

Weather permitting, the navy plans to fly 70 sorties a day during the exercise from bases at Halifax, Greenwood, N.S., and Summerside, P.E.I. No paratroops are to be dropped.
