### Labor Gov't Squeezes Out One-Vote Victory In Surprise Division

The London Times in a Cairo despatch said that King Farouk of Egypt has delayed his marriage to Narfiman Sadek until next year.

LONDON, May 1—(CP)—The Labor Government tonight squeezed out a one-vote victory in the House of Commons in a surprise Conservative assault on an appropriation for the Ministry of Transport.

The vote was 279 to 278, the narrowest Government majority since the new Government came to power Feb. 23.

Cheering, mingled with remarks of surprise greeted the result of tonight's division. Members were obviously astonished at the result.

### Gov't Declines To Reveal Possible Aid

OTTAWA, May 1—(CP)—The Government tonight promised "full and sympathetic consideration" for late filing of 1949-50 income tax returns by flood-stricken residents of Manitoba but declined for the time being to go beyond its general undertaking of flood assistance for that Province.

Acting Revenue Minister Winters, at the close of a debate on the disastrous Manitoba floods said he could announce that consideration would be given for late filing of income tax returns where it can be proven that delay was due to circumstances beyond the control of the taxpayer.

Not Yet at Peak  
The Minister, Manitoba's representative in the Cabinet, replying to numerous calls from Opposition members to name now the figure the Government would be prepared to spend for assistance, said floods had not yet reached their peak.

### Musical Festival Opened Auspiciously Last Evening

The fifth annual Festival of Music was officially opened last evening at the P.W.C. auditorium by His Honour Lieut. Governor J. A. Bernard.

Before an enthusiastic audience which packed the hall to overflowing, Lieut. Governor Bernard pointed out the great interest shown in the Festival, and stated that this proved it to be an event of unusual importance. He complimented the Musical Festival Association on their work, and in their deep belief in the worth of the talents of the contestants. He especially commended the presence of numerous contestants from the rural areas, assuring them that they were the backbone of the Festival.

Congratulations Extended  
Premier J. Walter Jones commented on the great increase in number of contestants, and congratulated the Executive on the excellent work they have been

doing. He assured them that any help the government could give would be gladly given. "Providing we can afford it," he added. Congratulations to the numerous contestants competing were extended by His Worship Mayor B. Earle MacDonald, who told them that the continuation of the Festival relied upon their untiring efforts. He also stated that the Festival itself was an important phase in the history of Prince Edward Island, music being a very necessary part of our everyday life.

Both adjudicators also spoke to the audience for a few minutes and stressed the importance of music in the world today. Mr. Philmore E. Hubble A.C.C.O. expressed his pleasure at being a part of such a thriving organization, and his appreciation of the very genuine and warm welcome he had received.

Mr. John Lee, F.R.C.O., L.R.A.M., L.T.C.L., expressed his pleasure at being home in the Maritimes after being for the past eight months in Los Angeles. He spoke of the growth of the Festival movement across Canada and the work that must be done to encourage the movement. "Festival of Music really means a feast of music," he said, "And we should all take advantage of it."

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On the other side of Brandenburg Gate, at least 300,000 East Berliners joined the Communist rally where Red-banners groups paraded for six hours along Unter Den Linden.
