ANOTHER PRIZE.—In addition to the prizes for the boat race on Saturday, to which reference has already been made, Mr. Eneas A. Macdonald presented an elegant clock.

Gentry, 2:00 1/2, and Joe Patchen, 2:0 1/2, to take place on Sept. 22 during the Breeders' annual meeting. W. J. Andrews represented the Gentry people and Ed Mills of Boston acted for C. W. Marks of Chicago on the Patchen end. Patchen was driven a mile last week by C. W. Marks in 2:02, and while Gentry has not been raced for two years—last year being engaged in exhibitions only—he has all his old-time speed.

THE SEA VIEW HOTEL.

Mr. Cox's New Quarters at Souris—Improvements Made.

Mr. B. C. Cox, proprietor of the Sea View Hotel, has just moved into his new quarters, that large store and dwelling formerly occupied by Mr. W. L. Sterns. During the last three months the firm of Dingwell & Dingwell has had a small army of men remodelling and adding to the already spacious building, and to day it can hardly be recognized.

On the south side a veranda has been added running the length of the main building facing the adjacent lot which will be used as a lawn. There are three entrances, the ladies and side entrance to office and main entrance in front. Fronting on Main Street is the office and reading room, 32ft x 20, with plate glass front and fitted up with all the requirements of a modern hotel. On this flat are also parlors 24x20 ft, dining room 40x20 ft, four bedrooms, carving room and kitchen. A hall runs from the office to the lobby at the ladies entrance, from which a stair to the next floor leads. On this floor are situated seventeen large and well lighted bedrooms and bath room.

On the third floor which is not yet completed are eight more bedrooms overlooking the beautiful Colville Bay. The floors of the dining room and office, laid in tiling patterns with narrow stained and oiled soft wood, are very unique. The building throughout is heated with hot air. Souris can now boast of one of the best appointed hotels in the Province; and the cruising department in charge of Mrs. Cox which have had more than a provincial reputation in the past, promises to be even better in the future.

WEARING SOLDIER CLOTHES

"There is an entire absence of law protecting the army uniforms," observed an army officer to a reporter, "and, peculiar as it may seem, it is not a violation of law, military or civil, for any unauthorized person to wear the uniform of an officer or soldier. In other words, it would not violate any law if any one paraded the streets attired in the full military uniform of a general, colonel or other officer. In Europe it is entirely different, and if an unauthorized person publicly wore the uniform of an army or naval officer without authority he would be gobbled up, stripped of his military or naval fixings and would have a long stay in prison for his offense."

"There is a brass band in New York city each member of which wears a full general's uniform, with the stars on the shoulders, and some of the national guard of that city tried to have it abolished under existing law, but they failed to do so. The Grand Army badge and button, as also the badge of the Union Veteran legion and the Regular Army and Navy union and of the Mexican Veterans' union are protected to some extent by law in that the regulations of the army and navy provide that those entitled to them can wear them on certain official occasions, but even they are not as fully protected by law as they should be."

"The same absence of protection, legal protection, I mean, exists in relation to wearing the medal of honor awarded by congress, and it is known that certain persons have medals of that kind and have worn them without the authority of congress. The bow of the American Legion of Honor is, however, provided for by law, and it is a violation of law for any unauthorized person to have or wear it."—Washington Star.
