IRENE DUNNE STARS IN 'MUDLARK'

—Opening yesterday at the Capitol Theatre was Darryl F. Zanuck's presentation of "The Mudlark", starring Irene Dunne as Queen Victoria. "The Mudlark" has been enjoying un-sustained acclaim from the press and public of two continents. Filmed in authentic British settings by Twentieth Century Fox, "The Mudlark" tells the story of the legendary and romantic tale of a queen's throne. Based on a novel by Theodore Bonnet, the story finds Andrew Ray, playing the title mudlark, a poor young lad of the slum-side London Thames River region, in the Victorian era, gaining entrance to the royal castle and upsetting more than palace regality before he's through.
