**THE SCHOOLS.**—The city schools reopened today, after the midsummer holidays. The enrolment was 1,260, made up as follows: West Kent, 469; Prince Street, 512; Queen Square, 279.

The Prince of Wales College and St. Dunstan's College also reopened today.

St. Peter's day schools reopened today, with a number of new pupils.

The Convent schools reopened today.

**DECORATION DAY.**—On account of the rain on Sunday afternoon the Oddfellows had to postpone their Decoration Day service until yesterday forenoon. The proceedings took place yesterday forenoon, however, and the ceremony was of a most interesting character. The graves of the deceased brethren in the various cemeteries were becomingly decorated with flowers. The Oddfellows wish to thank the ladies of Alpha R-bekah Lodge and all brothers and friends who so kindly furnished them with the flowers which made their decoration service such a success.

**BOAT RACE YESTERDAY.**—A sail boat race took place in the Harbor yesterday. There were four starters, viz., The Cornet owned by the League of the Cross Band, the Now Then owned by James Doherty, the Smoothing Iron owned by John T. Mills, and a boat owned by James O'Connor. There was a fresh breeze blowing from the westward and the boats made good headway going up the East River. After turning the East River buoy the Cornet took the lead which she held and gradually widened between the boats, finishing first about two miles in advance of the second boat. The Now Then was second and the Smoothing Iron third. Considerable interest was manifested by the large number of spectators who assembled on the wharf to witness the race.

**FIRE AT FORT AUGUSTUS**

**THE ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH BADLY GUTTED.**

**Barn, Stable and Coach-House Destroyed—Small Insurance.**

Between one and two o'clock on Monday morning the alarming discovery was made that the outbuildings in connection with the residence of Rev. Allen J. Macdonald, at Fort Augustus, were on fire. As soon as the bad news became known the people of the vicinity turned out with all speed and made every effort to save the buildings. But their efforts proved fruitless, and the stable, barn and coach-house were soon destroyed. The live stock and most of the other contents were saved, however. The wind was blowing directly on the church, and from the burning outbuildings the fire communicated to that structure. Soon, despite the efforts made to save it, the church was in the grasp of the devouring element, and it was not long before its interior was badly gutted. By the most strenuous exertions, however, the altar, organ, stations and all the pews were saved. As the altar was being removed a portion of the wall fell in and several persons who were near by narrowly escaped serious injury.

The residence of Father Macdonald had a narrow escape from destruction.

The church at Fort Augustus was a fine brick structure which it cost between \$20,000 and \$25,000 to erect. It has lately been improved in various ways, adding to its value. All the insurance on it was \$2,000.

The outbuildings destroyed were worth between \$800 and \$1,000. The insurance thereon was only \$400.

The origin of the fire is not known, but it is suspected that several young men from the city who were in the vicinity of the place an hour or so before it was discovered could afford much information on the subject. These young men were under the influence of liquor, and were acting in a most unseemly manner. They crossed the ferry to Charlottetown yesterday morning.

Father Allen and his parishioners will have the sympathy of the public in the great loss they have sustained.
