TRADE OF CANADA.

For some time previous to the defeat and resignation of the late Government, the trade of Canada had shown an improved tendency. Exports and imports were both increasing, and the country was rejoicing in the certain prospect of a new era of prosperity.

CABINET DISAGREEMENTS.

The report that members of the Cabinet are in a state of disagreement concerning the proposed revision of the tariff may or may not be true. Its truth is, however, highly probable.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

A New York company has received the contract to print our currency. A New York architect has been called to report upon the west block. But a poor fellow crossing the border for employment is turned back!

The Canadian Architect and Builder for February contains a portrait and short biographical sketch of Mr. Robert Harris, President of the Royal Canadian Academy, and it says that "the present prospective condition of the Society is in no small measure due to his labors on its behalf."

In the course of his speech at the opening of the British Columbia Legislature, Lieut. Governor Dewdney said: "It gives me great satisfaction to learn that the widespread discovery of phenomenal mineral wealth throughout the province has attracted capital from the great financial centres, and that great activity is manifested in the development of our mining industry, as evidenced by the large increase of the public revenue. Notwithstanding that the output of coal is less than last year, from the increased competition in the San Francisco market, the value of the annual export of minerals of all kinds exhibits a very large increase."

turn to Detroit on the 16th inst, made the following statement to the Press: "I have been exceedingly careful that no premature statements be given out by anyone representing the United States regarding the plans, opinions or expectations of either myself or my associates. Silence in this regard has been maintained for obvious reasons. Of course I cannot say anything definite about the investigation, for it is still in progress. Both sides have yet to submit printed briefs and present oral arguments. The former will be done before the commission meets again in Montreal on June 16, when motions may be made on the points at issue, and when a time for the hearing will probably be fixed a month after the June meeting. It may be held in Toronto. I will say this, however. Personally I am very well satisfied with the result of the investigation to date in so far as the United States is concerned, but regarding the merits or demerits of the claims presented by the British and Canadian subjects or our methods and success in supporting them I can say nothing at this time. At the recent hearing both the British and Canadian Governments were ably represented. Not only was Sir Charles H. Tupper there, but men of such distinguished legal ability as F. L. Beique, of Quebec, a great civil lawyer, and E. Boswell, also one of the Queen's Counsel. I wish to say that while in the Victoria the American representatives were most hospitably entertained, and were shown many delicate courtesies. It is rather strange that the "Senior" Counsel for the Federal Government of Canada, the Hon. F. Peters, should not be mentioned by Mr. Dickinson along with the other Canadian Counsel. Some people may think that this omission is pretty strong evidence of Premier Peters' did not render very important service. I suggest, however, that judgment on this point be suspended until the amount of Mr. Peters' bill is announced. We pledge our reputation that, measured by any standard, Mr. Peters' services will not suffer by my comparison."
