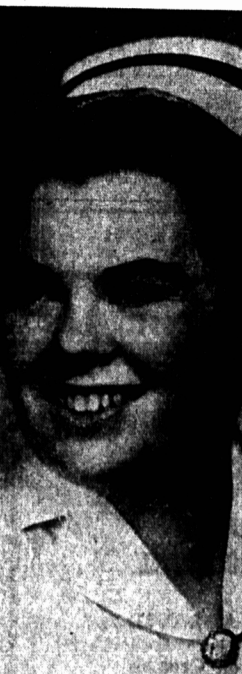

70,000 Rebel Troops Massed Near Hanoi

PARIS (Reuters) — About 70,000 Vietminh rebel troops are massed only 25 miles north and south of Hanoi, the capital of Indo-China's Red river delta, according to reports received here Tuesday night. Although there was a danger that the Vietminh commander-in-chief, Gen. Vo Nguyen Giap, might launch a pincer movement against Hanoi, French military quarters here remained confident that such an assault was not imminent. French troops, after abandoning the southern part of the delta, were taking up battle positions on a line approximately 65 miles long running south of the vital Hanoi-Haiphong communications artery. For the most part, the new French positions are 18 to 25 miles south of the Hanoi-Haiphong "lifeline."

DURBAN, South Africa (AP) — Armed police stood by Tuesday to evict 7,000 striking African stevedores from their company-owned homes unless they comply with a return to work order within 24 hours. The strikers are demanding a wage increase of 4 shillings nine pence (66 cents) to bring their daily rate to 15 shillings (\$2.10).

Island Strawberries Fast Gaining Reputation For Unsurpassed Quality

Prince Edward Island has been credited with many firsts in the past such as her foxes, potatoes, oysters and scenic beauty. But still another first is fast gaining a reputation for the Garden Province. The Prince Edward Island strawberry, for flavour and quality, is unsurpassed," says the consumer of many of the largest Canadian cities and in an effort to meet this increasing demand for the Island product, the Strawberry Growers Association of Charlottetown and the Strawberry Exchange of Mount Stewart have for a number of years been trying to encourage producers to grow berries in greater quantities. At Mount Stewart about 50,000 lbs. of berries are being processed daily and at a recently organized plant set up at the Exhibition Grounds, the Charlottetown growers are preparing about 20,000 lbs. daily to be put in storage for commercial trade which was arranged by advanced sale as early as last February. The handling of the small fruit through these two organizations has done much to stabilize the market. It is estimated by one grower that if the volume of berries packed by the two plants had been dumped on the local market in the past two days, much of the crop would have to be sacrificed for want of an outlet. The Mount Stewart plant is putting the berries up in small one lb. containers for consumer use, while the Charlottetown plant, where 170 girls and women are working almost around the clock, is processing the berries up in 24 lb. pails intended for commercial use. It is noted that as soon as the berries have been sugared and placed in storage, the responsibility of the processor ceases. The berries are simply placed in the Government Cold Storage Plant and delivery is taken at the convenience of the buyer. The Strawberry Growers Association of this province are hopeful of developing further processing methods such as the making of preserves in glass jars. The members feel that they are following the trend of diversified farming which is bound to form part of the Island agricultural system. With the demand about ten times the amount of the supply, a bright future for this, one of the newest industries, seems assured.

FEDERATION DIRECTORS GUESTS AT FIELD DAY AT EXPERIMENTAL FARM

A most successful field day was held yesterday afternoon when the directors of the Prince Edward Island Federation of Agriculture were guests of Mr. R. C. Parent and his staff at the Experimental Farm.

Starting at one p.m. standard time, the directors were taken on a tour of the Farm, including Upton and Beach Grove, and the program from beginning to end was of such an interesting and varied nature that when the tour was completed and everyone sat down to a delicious chicken dinner served by the ladies of the Parkdale Women's Institute, it was felt that much had been learned and a very pleasant day spent.

Headed by the Superintendent, Mr. Parent, who welcomed the guests, each official of the Experimental Station showed the directors to their departments and gave them an interesting description of the work being carried out. Mr. Gordon Warren showed them the beautiful flowers and shrubbery, as well as the orchard. Mr. Parent took the guests to the poultry barn and described the experiments being carried out. Mr. James Nicholson aroused much interest in his account of the bull experiments being carried out in the Farm herd and in co-operation with some of the outstanding Ashire breeders near the City.

The group was very interested in the artificial insemination project being conducted. They moved next to the piggery where a program concerning advanced registry was being carried on in co-operation with the production service of the Federal Department of Agriculture. Mr. Bruce MacLaren, farm cerologist, outlined a program of crop rotation and showed plots and their comparative results. Mr. Dick Stirling told of the work his department was doing in the way of experimenting with certain types of insect and disease resistant varieties of grain.

A very interesting feature of the tour was a visit to the soil fertility and soil survey laboratory where Mr. G. B. Whiteside illustrated how the fertility of the soil is determined and acidity tests were made. The next portion of the tour dealt with crop yield according to comparative amounts of manure and fertilizer being used.

The party then went by auto to beautiful Upton Farm where a brief stop for coffee was made. Some very instructive pastureland experiments were described by Mr. James Nicholson. Members of the Federation were particularly interested in the self feeder barn in use at Upton.

A trip to Beach Grove Farm gave the guests an opportunity of seeing the work being carried on in connection with organic matter in the soil. At six o'clock a bountiful dinner awaited the directors at Birch Court. Mr. Parent told those present of the pleasure it had been to have had the portion of the tour Federation with him and his staff. He felt that everyone had profited as a result. He called upon two members of his staff, who had not been present for the field day, to give a brief account of the activities in their respective departments. Mr. Norman Black, supervisor of illustration stations, outlined some of the projects being carried on in his field, which included soil fertility tests, pasture experiments, farm business, woodland management and re-forestation. Mr. Warren Burns who is the apiarist at the station, stated that 70 hives are kept at the Farm with 60,000 bees in each. He was of the opinion the Island could be considered one of the best bee-keeping centres in Canada. Mr. Burns also gave a short talk on the records kept regarding precipitation and how these were used in determining crop production.

Mr. R. R. Hurst, administrative officer of the Science Service Laboratory, spoke briefly and urged the farmers to become better acquainted with the work being carried out, both at the Laboratory and at the Experimental Farm. He spoke of the splendid co-operation between his department and the Farm and paid high tribute to Mr. Parent who he said was responsible for this co-operation.

Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture, was present for the dinner. He commended the Superintendent of the Farm for his fine gesture of inviting the directors of the Federation of Agriculture to the field day. He urged the farmer to take advantage of the experiments being carried out. "Never before has agriculture been more dependent upon scientific knowledge than at the present time," said the minister. Mr. S. C. Wright, deputy minister of agriculture noted the many mechanical aids in use on the farm but felt that the large program being carried out still involved a great deal of work. Brief remarks were made by Mr. Neil A. Matheson, M.P., who with his wife and his brother John M. Matheson of Edmonton, attended the field day. Mr. Roland MacDonald, president of the Prince Edward Island Federation of Agriculture, also spoke briefly, and in conclusion offered a hearty vote of thanks to Mr. Parent and the members of his staff for a most successful day. This was seconded by Mr. Louis O'Connor of Clinton and supported by Mr. Charles Yeo, Lot 18, past president of the Federation.

Injured In Fire At Cable Head

Two men were slightly injured yesterday afternoon during a fire which completely destroyed the home of Mr. Andrew MacDonald of Cable Head.

The blaze, which started while Mr. and Mrs. MacDonald were visiting in Charlottetown, was uncontrollable by the time neighbors reached the residence and were able to break into the house. They managed to save all except the kitchen furniture in the lower floor while everything upstairs was a total loss.

While attempting to break into the building, one man was seriously cut around the ankle, and a second man received burns on his head and hands.

The Cable Head school, which is situated close to the MacDonald residence, became endangered because of the intensity of the flames but was saved through the aid of a crowd which soon quickly gathered.
