Games postponed by rain shall be played at a new date set by the president and must be played within ten days from the original date or the teams forfeit the points.

Players who take part in one City League, Island League or organized County League baseball game will be barred from the softball league for the remainder of the year.

The home team will be required to provide one new softball and another softball in good condition for each game.

The case of a player being ejected from a game will be brought before the executive for deliberation before punishment is meted out. No protest will be received unless handed in writing to the president of the league within 24 hours of the game under protest.

A player who strikes an official will be suspended for the remainder of the season. A complaint must be submitted to the league president by the official in question.

The five man executive will hold regular meetings and a special meeting on the first Monday of every month will be held with one representative from each team present.

Report Surplus In Empire Games

VANCOUVER (CP)—The British Empire Games Society Tuesday reported an estimated surplus of \$26,538 in its financial statement on last summer's Empire Games here.

But the actual deficit was approximately \$155,000, caused by an additional expenditure of \$181,222 in Empire Stadium roofing and floodlighting costs.

The society, however, denies responsibility for the costs, placing it as a city charge. Total cost of building the stadium is shown as \$1,371,846, plus the light and roofing costs.

The financial balance lists a cash balance of \$32,450 as of April 30, and estimates future receipts at \$3,653 and future expenditures at \$9,575.

The provincial government has contributed \$50,000 to meet the \$135,000 deficit; and the federal government has been asked to contribute a similar amount.

If the federal government grants \$50,000, the city is expected to contribute the balance.
