### General Telegraphic News.

ROME, Dec. 28.—The Dreibund nations, Germany, Italy and Austria, regard the situation in France as menacing the peace of Europe, and are exchanging frequent notes on the subject. They have decided to hold themselves in readiness to act promptly, from a military point of view, in the event of a revolution in France.

St. PETERSBURG, Dec. 28.—The court martial in Taskend passed sentence on the leaders of the cholera riots on July 6th last. Seventy men were tried, and eight were sentenced to be strangled; four to lose all civil rights and deportation to Siberia for life; thirty-three to long terms of imprisonment, and twenty-five were acquitted.

LONDON, Dec. 29.—The authorities appear so strongly convinced that the Dublin explosion was part of the work of a band of conspirators that they have sent a detective to Biarritz to keep guard over Mr. Glasstone and protect him from outrage. Home Secretary Asquith is also protected.

WICHITA, Kansas, Dec. 29.—Thomas Griffith, living six miles north of Leon, left his three children at home yesterday, while he went to town. On his return he found only the burning embers of his house and the charred remains of his three children. He is insane from the shock.

LONDON, Dec. 29.—The Liverpool correspondent of the Daily News thinks there are no grounds for believing that the steamship companies will give up their steamer trade. They expect, he says, the United States Government will relax shortly its stringent quarantine regulations, when it has been shown how much easier it is to watch a few seaports, instead of the whole Canadian frontier.

MOSCOW, N. B., Dec. 23.—Havelock Johnson, a farmer belonging to Shenogue, parish of Botsford, came to Moncton a fortnight ago to-day with poultry and other produce for market. He remained here two days and Saturday night, the 10th inst, sold the balance of his stock to a dealer, saying he desired to return home. Johnson had been fifty and one hundred dollars on his person. He was last seen Saturday night in company with a young man named Durant. They were drinking and Durant appeared to have money while Johnson had none. Johnson's brother-in-law, who is here looking for him, believes he has been foully dealt with, as he had no reason to leave home and had accompanied a number of parties to take a quantity of poultry to the Halifax market during Christmas week.


