MacDonald Rink Undeatable Down R.C.A.F. And S'side Yesterday

Chadwick Blanks Boston Bruins For 2nd Shutout

TORONTO (CP) — Tod Sloan, Toronto's sharpshooting centre, ran his goal total to 32 Wednesday night as the Maple Leafs defeated Boston Bruins 1-0 in a rough National Hockey League game before 13,077 fans.

The victory increased Toronto's hold on fourth place in the standings—the last playoff position—to four points over the fifth-place Boston club.

The game was vital to both clubs and they put plenty of fight into it. Referee Red Storey handed out 18 minor penalties and two 10-minute misconduct sentences.

The misconducts went to left-winger Dick Duff of the Leafs in the first period for arguing over a hooking penalty, and Leo Labine, fiery Bruin right-winger, for protesting a roughing sentence in the final minute of play with Boston pressing for the tying goal.

Sloan's tally came at the 3:56 mark of the third period on a passing play with linemates Duff and George Armstrong.

Duff carried into the Boston zone and relayed to Armstrong along the boards. Sloan managed to get behind Bruin defenseman Bob Armstrong beside the Boston cage and had only to tuck Armstrong's perfect pass behind goalie Terry Sawchuk.

SECOND SHUTOUT Sharing the Toronto spotlight with Sloan was rookie netminder Ed Chadwick, who turned in his second shutout in three games.

Called up from Winnipeg Warriors to fill in for injured Harry Lumley, the 22-year-old Chadwick now has allowed only three goals in the five games he has played.

An off season policeman at Keswick, Ont., he was the Leafs' practice goalie only a couple of seasons ago, and this is his first professional year.

After three complete rounds of play in the British Consols Bonspiel at the Montague Curling rink, yesterday, two of the four participating rinks have been eliminated in the double-knockout competition and only one remains undefeated.

A Charlottetown rink, skipped by Dr. Wendall MacDonald, went through the competition yesterday with two wins and drew the bye for the third round. The rinks eliminated were the Montague foursome led by Peter Sinclair, and the R.C.A.F. led by F.L. Padre Hugh Christmas.

Montague was defeated twice in succession, once in the morning by the MacFarlane team of Summerside, and again in the afternoon by the R.C.A.F. team of Summerside. The R.C.A.F. team lost to Dr. MacDonald in the morning, and to Summerside in the evening.

Yesterday morning in the first round of the two-day spiel, the winner of which will represent the Province at the forthcoming Dominion Finals at Moncton, Dr. MacDonald picked up his first win as skip of the Charlottetown rink and skip F.L. Padre Hugh Christmas of the R. C. A. F. rink.

The final end proved the strategy even though the game was lost. On the tee Summerside counted two up front with both stones together, with another further out on the red. The R.C.A.F. had one blither at the back of the tee for third shot. The strategy was now for Padre Christmas with his flagstone to corner strike one of the two rocks, kick them both off, lay sho' with his hand and count two to win the game. His shot was perfect except for being a trifle heavy. He knocked out the two counters, one of which carried off the red, leaving the Summerside bitter to count the afternoon by the R.C.A.F. team with baited breath, and a round of applause approved this gallant shot.

Today Dr. Wendall MacDonald and Mr. Horace MacFarlane will meet at 2:30 p.m. If Dr. MacDonald wins the afternoon game, he is the winner of the meet. If Mr. MacFarlane wins, another game will be played in the evening at 7:30.

The original fourth-round tie at Burnley between the first division clubs was a 1-1 draw, the replay at Chelsea was another 1-1 draw, a second replay at neutral Birmingham ended in a 2-2 deadlock, and a third replay at neutral Arsenal ended 0-0.

The total playing time, including an extra half hour in the first three replays, was nine hours—only 22 minutes short of the endurance record set by Stoke and Bury a year ago.
