GROWTH OF METHODISM.—According to the Methodist Year Book, just issued, the total membership of the Methodist Episcopal church numbers 2,281,654, being an increase of 46,691 over last year. The communicants in the United States number 4,980,243, with 31,765 ministers and 54,711 churches.

BAD NEWS FROM THE EAST.

Earthquake, Famine, Pestilence.

LONDON, Feb. 5.

Advices from Java report that an earthquake occurred in that Island on the 12th of December. In the town of Joana, the Chinese quarter was absolutely destroyed and the European quarter rendered almost uninhabitable. All the districts of West and Middle Java suffered more or less severely.

In Siam, the rice crop is a failure, and unless measures for relief are speedily taken, a rebellion and riot by the starving unemployed will ensue.

Pekin is suffering from a severe epidemic of influenza and the silk trade is in a stagnant condition.

"THE PEOPLE'S JIMMY."

The Montreal civic elections on the 2nd resulted in the return of Hon. James McShane as Mayor by a vote of 10,935 against 5,058 for Major Grenier. The chief event of the ward contest was the defeat of C. A. Beauvois, M.P., in the east ward.

EXAMINATIONS.—The half yearly examinations of the Board of Trade, held this morning, it was decided to defer action on the report of the different sections. We understand that the tests were severe and that the students acquitted themselves in a very satisfactory manner.

THE TUNNEL.—At a meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade, held this morning, it was decided to defer action on the report of the tunnel committee for the present; and another committee, composed of Messrs. Horace Haszard, F. T. Newbery, and L. L. Beer, was appointed to gather statistics on the trade of the Province to place before the public. The committee was authorized to expend if necessary, funds of the Board to the amount of \$50 in this work.

TRURO'S PROSPERITY.—The first year of incorporation, 1876, the value of town property footed up \$852,150; this year it amounted \$1,500,000, an increase in 15 years of \$644,850, an average yearly increase of \$42,900. The greatest gain was in 1888, it being an increase of \$657,149 over that of 1887. In 1880 there was a falling off from that of 1879 amounting to \$4,700. The increase of 1891 over 1890 is \$80,000. From the above figures it will be seen that the town is progressing, notwithstanding the cry of those who say the country is going behind.
