

Demanas For Labour Rose Faster In July Than In '54

OTTAWA (CP)—Unemployment continued to decline in July as demands for labor rose at a faster rate than in 1954, the bureau of statistics reported today.

The bureau's monthly labor survey estimated 150,000 persons were jobless and seeking work in the week ended July 23, compared with 157,000 a month earlier and 172,000 in the corresponding week of 1954.

Separate figures issued at the same time by the labor department showed 211,280 unfilled job applications on file at National Employment Service offices at July 21. This was a decline of 40,836 from the June 16 figure of 252,116 and a drop of 52,234 from the July 22, 1954, total of 203,514.

STUDENT INFUX

The bureau said its labor survey found that a seasonal influx of students and other part-time workers helped boost the labor force almost to the same extent as employment increased.

"Unemployment hereof dropped only slightly, a usual occurrence at this time of the year," it said.

It reported 4,791,000 persons, 83.5 per cent of the labor force, worked full time—35 hours or more—in the survey week, compared with 4,601,000 a year earlier. The total was 205,000 less than the June figure of 4,996,000 full-time workers, but the number of full-time workers on vacation rose to 445,000 in July from 53,000 a month earlier.

ALL GROUPS RISE

The bureau said all major industry groups had higher employment during July, with increases of 108,000 in farming and 22,000 in non-farm industries. There were moderate gains in forestry, mining, manufacturing, construction and trade industries.

"Labor requirements and available supply were in better balance than at any time during the last four years," it reported.

The labor department said its employment service figures of unfilled job applications were lower than in every region. Regional totals for July 21, with June 16 figures in brackets:

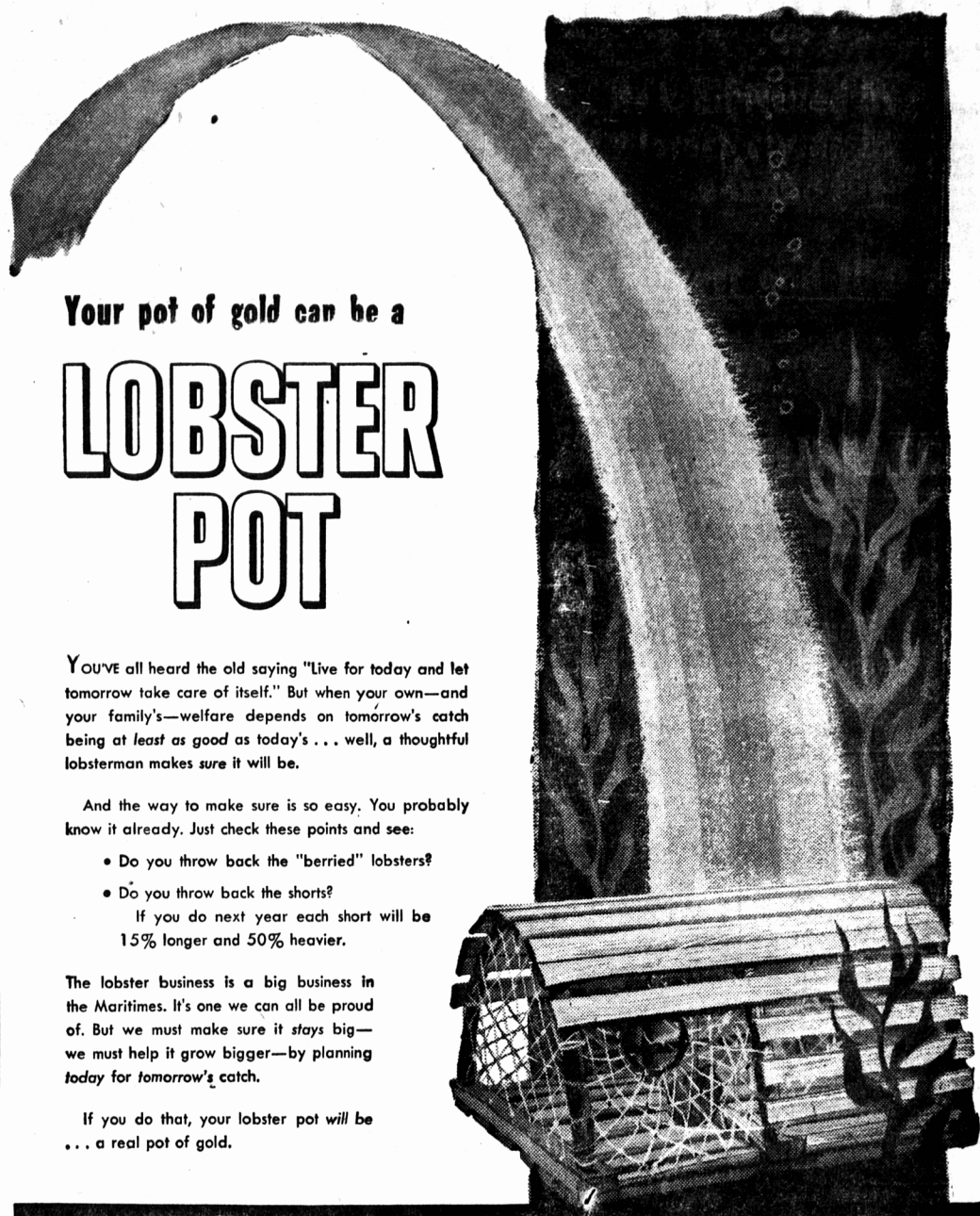
