HAMILTON'S exports to the United States for April amounted to \$55,964, an increase of \$6,249 over the previous April. The largest items were wool, \$22,093; animals, \$9,207; skins, \$7,446; wool, only \$2,403, and sewing machines, \$2,013.

It was my intention to close the Navigation Class after the above men had passed their examinations, but, as I have received applications from some who already hold mates' certificates of competency, and have served sufficient time under those certificates to enable them to present themselves as candidates for Masters, have made arrangements with the examiners to have another examination in June, after which the School will be closed and Board withdrawn. Since this School was first opened, upwards of one hundred men have passed and received certificates of competency, and I may say in justice to them that, in looking over the Register, I find they have been more successful in obtaining certificates than those at any other Board in the Dominion.—L.
