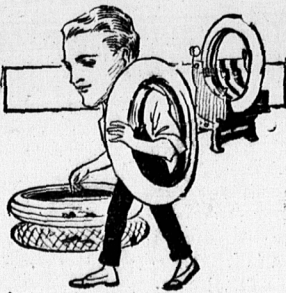

New Businesses In The Tanton Building

Fine Stores to be Opened up. Building Thoroughly Renovated and Painted

For the last six weeks carpenters, painters and plasterers have been busily engaged upon the Tanton building, corner of Kent and Great George Streets, recently occupied by the Canadian Farm Products Inc. in giving it a thorough over-haul and renovating the worn of which is now about completed. The exterior, after extensive repairs to the woodwork, has been neatly painted with two coats of a light fawn color with the casings and trimmings in a coffee shade and black sashes and doors. Inside the three stores have been finished with from two to three coats of paint, principally of gloss white, with apple and pea green belts between the shelving and ceilings. The Great George Street store has the inset window, formerly there, replaced, and a suitable entrance provided for the suite of offices on the second floor.

The Kent Street store is to be occupied as a general furnishing and special childrens clothing store by Messrs. George Jenkins, for many years in the clothing department of Provost Bros. Ltd., and Edward Jay, recently in the gents' furnishing department of Mr. S. A. McDonald.

The Empire Photo Company, doing business in several maritime cities, with head office in Halifax, now occupy the Great George St. store. "Mercury" light, the first of its kind ever seen in this city, having already attracted hundreds to see it and its peculiar shades which can be seen from the furthest visible parts of the street.

The corner stores and offices are being occupied but are under negotiation with different parties.

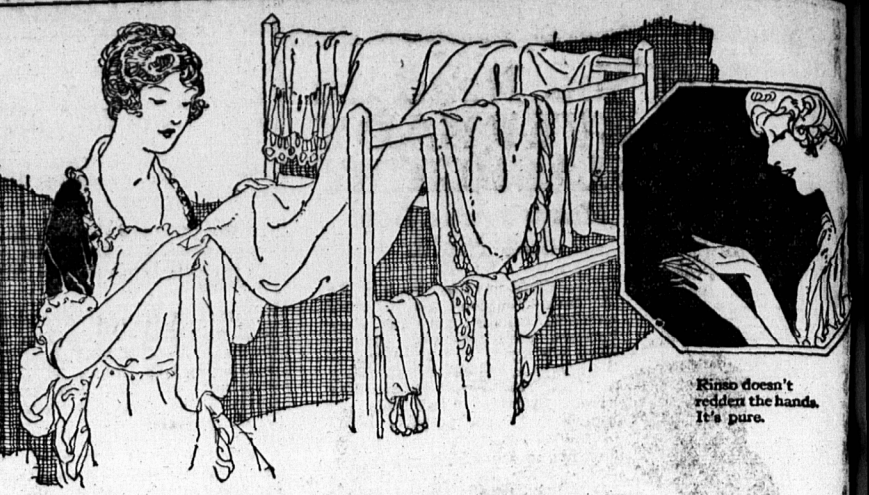
With the new Bank of Nova Scotia building, the projected theatre on the opposite corner and the permanent asphalt street under present construction, the Great George St. is swiftly taking first place as the business centre of the city, and the splendid improvements made in this building and the new business enterprises introduced will further add to the beauty and popularity of the place.

MANY NEW PRODUCTS BEING MADE IN CANADA.

An important work, bearing directly on the promotion of Canadian trade at home and abroad, is now being carried on by the commercial intelligence department of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association. This is the compilation of a new edition of the Canadian Trade Index, which will contain the name and address of every manufacturer in Canada and a list of the products which he manufactures. It is anticipated that the new index will show that within the past three years well over 2,000 articles will be added to the list of goods being manufactured in Canada, a striking tribute to the enterprise of Canadian manufacturers in undertaking the production of new lines. The Canadian Trade Index has the support of the Dominion department of trade and commerce and is circulated very widely among the importers of countries interested in Canadian goods. Sections are printed in French and Spanish for the convenience of buyers in countries speaking these languages. The value of the index in Canada is almost self-evident, for it directly promotes the purchase of made-in-Canada goods, and thus does its part in keeping Canadian workmen employed. In a word, it is an effective missionary both at home and abroad on behalf of Canadian manufacturing industry. The new index will be issued about the beginning of 1923.

HANGS ON BY FINGER TIPS DOES INDUSTRY IN EAST

OTTAWA, June 12.—Industry in the Maritime Provinces is hanging on by the finger tips, said Hon. R. E. Finn, in presenting the case for those three provinces before the special house committee on railway costs this morning. Mr. Finn stated that "the natural current of trade was violently changed by confederation," and in addition in recent years the industries of these provinces had been heavily handicapped by increased freight rates.



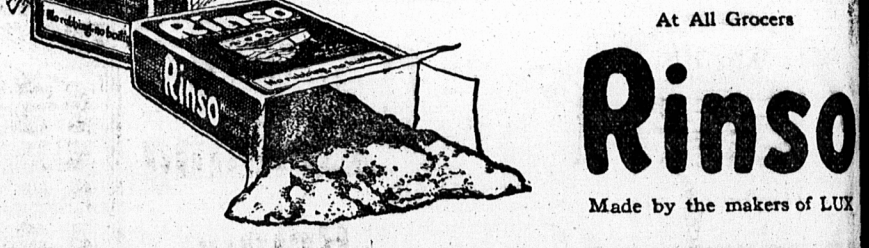

PAPER PLANT FOR B. C.

A paper mill, to cost \$100,000, is to be erected on the north arm of the Fraser River within the boundaries of the city of New Westminster, according to an announcement made by the Westmaster Paper Co. About one hundred men will be engaged, and it is the intention to manufacture tissue and other thin paper from British Columbia pulp for the Canadian and Oriental markets.
