WE are sorry to learn that potato bugs have made their appearance in close proximity to the city. A field of potatoes on the Malpene Road, opposite the old Cemetery, has been found to be literally alive with the pests. Paris green is in demand, and is being liberally applied, and should this treatment fail the Bug Act will be appealed to.

THE fire bell sounded shortly after 10 o'clock on Saturday night for a slight fire in the plankings of Peake's Wharf No. 1. The firemen promptly responded to the call of duty, but their services were fortunately unnecessary, as the fire, which is supposed to have been caused by the accidental dropping of a lighted cigar or match into one of the cracks, was extinguished almost as soon as the alarm was given.

At the annual meeting of the shareholders of the Panama Canal Company, M. de Lesseps, on behalf of the board of directors, presented a voluminous report, which he read. In this he took a very favorable view of the situation. He expressed confidence in the completion of the canal by June, 1889, within the cost estimated by the Congress of 1879, and said that he believed there would be little difficulty in securing the necessary funds.

THE PARNELLITES DECISION

Additional Appointments!

LONDON, Aug. 2. An exchange of views among the Parnellites has led to a decision being arrived at to give the Government time to prepare an Irish bill, but the Parnellites will demand measures for the suspension of evictions as owing to the heavy fall in prices of produce, tenants in Ireland are in arrears and are unable to pay their rents. If the introduction of an Irish bill be postponed until spring the landlords will, in all likelihood, resort to wholesale evictions unless they are restrained from so doing.

The following appointments have been officially announced:— Secretary of State for India—Sir Richard Cross. Lord of the Privy Seal—Earl Cadogan. Secretary of State for the Colonies—Edward Stanhope. President of the Board of Trade—Edward Stanley.

News and Notes from Halifax.

HALIFAX, Aug. 2. The Intercolonial Railway magnates arrived here yesterday. The present is the hottest season we have had for many years. The Royal Irish Rifles (regulars) defeated the Princess Louise Fusiliers (volunteers) in a rifle competition on Saturday, by five points. The Wanderers' cricket team defeated an eleven from the garrison in a match on Saturday. The playing on both sides was splendid. The Herald to-day publishes despatches from the Rev. Moses Harvey and the Attorney General of Newfoundland, denouncing the recent reports of the starvation and destitution said to exist there as malicious falsehoods. The bogus despatches emanated at Ottawa, and are the product of notorious Grit liars.

An Unwieldy Monster.

AMHERST, Aug. 2. The attempts to launch the big timber raft resulted in failure. Three thousand people were present. At the first attempt the raft would not move; a third attempt was made on Sunday at noon. It then started 200 feet, when the cradle on which it was built collapsed and the monster raft was wrecked. In making the attempt to launch the raft some of the chains broke and the huge pile stuck in the mud. It is said to be an impossibility to successfully launch it now. This will be a heavy loss for the New York owners.

A Fatality Narrowly Averted.

MONTREAL, Aug. 2. What was nearly a fatal accident occurred on the Grand Trunk Railway. As the Saturday train for Boston and Portland was about crossing the Canal, the engineer saw that the bridge was open and that a yawning chasm lay before him. He at once applied the brakes but they would not work, and the engine and tender went into the Canal. Fortunately the coupling broke and the cars remained on the track.

Stopping a Prize Fight.

MONCTON, N. B., Aug. 2. The Police Marshal on Saturday night stopped the prize fight between Jack McGee and Mike Bogan. The fight was called on at the close of a sparring exhibition, but was stopped before the first round was reached. A large number of spectators had paid one dollar each for admission. Daniel McDonald died on Saturday from the effects of a fall.

Again Rioting in Belfast.

BELFAST, Aug. 2. Street squabbles, between Catholic and Protestant mobs, assumed the proportions of riots. The police were totally unable to deal with the mobs and the military were called out and fired upon the rioters. A small boy, named Knox, who was going on an errand, was shot dead. Many of the police and rioters were seriously wounded.

A Brutal Prize Fight.

LONDON, Aug. 2. A prize fight which resulted in the death of one of the contestants has taken place at Rhonda, Wales. The pugilists were men named Evans and James. Thirty-two rounds were fought and Evans, who was shockingly beaten, was carried home in a horrible condition and died shortly after.

To contest the Election.

MONTREAL, Aug. 2. The Chamby election, which was carried by the grossest corruption and violence, will be contested in the courts. At St. Lambert's, where the Tories expected 50 of a majority, the Reilites closed the poll two hours before the time on an alleged informality.

Arrival of the Galatea.

MARBLE HEAD, Aug. 2. The English racing yacht Galatea, which is to compete for the America's cup, arrived here and Marblehead has gone crazy over her reception.

A New Departure.

SYDNEY, Aug. 2. The Y. M. C. A. Convention has decided to employ a travelling Secretary for the Maritime Provinces at a salary of \$1,000 per year.
