Cook's Corner. Tomato Soup Salad. 2 envelopes plain gelatine, 1/2 cup water, 1 can tomato soup, 2 3-ounce packages cream cheese, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1 cup salad dressing or mayonnaise, 1/2 cup diced green pepper, 1/2 cup finely diced celery, 1/4 cup minced onion.

Aspic. (In which to mold any savory salad.) Mix together 2-3 cup spirit vinegar, 2 2-3 cups boiling water, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 1-3 cup gelatine in 2-3 cup cold water and juice of 2 large lemons. Boil the first mixture. Stir in the soaked mixture. Strain. Cool before adding vegetables or moulding. Enough to mould salad for 12 people.

DOROTHY DIX'S COLUMN - Lazy Girl

DEAR MISS DIX: My one weakness is laziness. I am by no means a slovenly girl, but I am inclined to put off today what I can do tomorrow. I am being married in six months, and would like to cure myself of this terrible thing. I want to be a good wife but a lazy girl can't be both lazy and a good wife.

ANSWER: Your position was summed up some time ago by the fiancée of a young friend of mine. The girl was beset by exactly your woe—the admitted laziness while wanting to be an efficient housewife. Said her fiancée, "I don't know what you're going to do; you're too lazy to keep a clean house and too particular to live in a dirty one."

There is a possibility that physical condition may be at the bottom of your difficulty. A thorough check-up, followed by faithful adherence to the doctor's orders, may effect considerably increase in your ambition.

DEAR MISS DIX: My husband and I have been married three years; we are both 25. Soon after the wedding, his sister and brother moved in with us. She's 17 and he is 19. ANSWER: Most dancing schools are quite expensive, but I think you will find community houses in your neighborhood where lessons are given. Her teacher at school should be able to help you locate one. Such organizations as the Y. W. C. A., Y. W. H. A., neighborhood centers or local high schools generally hold classes for teenagers.
