

Youth Club Shades S'side 8-7

Lloyd Shepherd Fires 3 Goals To Pace B.Y.C. Attack

The Bastien Youth Club, paced by the three-goal performance of Lloyd Shepherd, moved back into third place in the Island Senior Hockey League by squeezing out a 7-6 decision over the second-place Summerside Aces in a thrills-packed match at the Sports Arena last night. The win moved the Youth Club several percentage points ahead of the idle Montague Primroses and closer to the Aces.

Merrill Pineau, who combined with Buck Whitlock and Jack Ready for the opening goal of the game, closed the scoring near the midway mark of the final frame in providing what proved to be the winning marker. Jackie Burse of the Youth Club and Wally Shephard of the Aces were the high point getters each collecting four Burke with a goal and three assists and Shephard with two and two.

Six minor penalties were called by referees Brian MacCallum and Emmet Trainor, with each team receiving three.

Play was slow at the beginning of all three sessions but the tempo kept increasing all the time with the last five minutes of each period wide-open hockey. B.Y.C. led 6-5 going into the final frame but a pair of goals by the Aces within the first five minutes of play sent the Westerners into the lead again.

The Charlottetown team bounced right back with a break away for Squarbriggs and a fine passing play by Pineau, Whitlock and Ready giving the win to the Youth Club. During the last few minutes of play the Aces laid on the pressure and peppered Jackie Shephard in the B.Y.C. cage but failed to produce a tying goal even with the advantage of an extra forward after they pulled goalie. was shortlived when Saints moved in front 8-2 as Kelly hit twice. Fearon once and Morrison sniped the ball from an unsuspecting Moncton player for the 8 points.

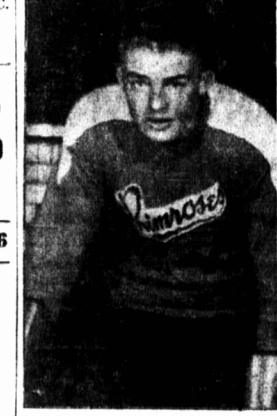

B. C. Upsets N. Ontario In Ch'ships

WINNIPEG (CP)—British Columbia defeated Northern Ontario 11-8 Thursday night on the final round of the Dominion high school curling championships to force a sudden-death playoff between the Northerners and Ontario. Ontario whipped Nova Scotia 6-3 to finish in the first-place tie with seven wins and two losses.

Johnston, 17-year-old shotmaker from Kingston Collegiate, kept the house clear on the final end to protect his through margin in the low-scoring game. Ontario's two-enders on the fifth and seventh were the highest counts of the contest.

Saskatchewan and Manitoba tied for third place, one back of the leaders with records of six wins and three losses apiece.

Saskatchewan's Ron Paulson scored his sixth straight triumph by beating Prince Edward Island 9-4 while Henry Riendeau of Verdun bested New Brunswick 13-5. Quebec shutout Alberta down to fifth position in the final standings by downing the westerners 7-5.

ISLANDERS WHIP B. C.

Northern Ontario Takes Over Top Curling Spot

WINNIPEG (CP)—New Brunswick made its second victory of the Dominion high school curling championship a big one Thursday, knocking off pace-setting Ontario 8-7 and shunting them down to second spot.

Northern Ontario, connecting for two on the last end, defeated Alberta 9-7 to take over sole possession of the top rung, with only one draw remaining in the four-day nine-round competition. Carl Konefal's Port Arthur rink now has seven wins and one loss, with Kingston's Ian Johnston one game back. Johnston missed a routine takeout on the last end to hand the game to 18-year-old Harold MacGinnis of Moncton.

Konefal could win the title Thursday night with a victory over British Columbia on the final round. It would take a Northern

Ontario loss and an Ontario triumph over Nova Scotia to force a playoff, which would start immediately after the ninth draw.

Defending champion Saskatchewan, hottest rink in the competition at present, stretched its winning streak to five by humbling Quebec 14-6. Manitoba defeated Nova Scotia 13-5 while Prince Edward Island turned aside B.C. 11-8.

Alberta, Manitoba and Saskatchewan were in a three-way tie for third place, each with record of five wins and three losses, but with no chance of capturing the championship.

Johnston, one of the steadiest curlers in the classic, had only to punch out a New Brunswick counter on the eight-foot ring to win as he was holding second shot on the 12-foot circle. He came down with good weight on the return but skinned by the shot rock by less than an inch.

Prince Edward Island came home only one up after allowing British Columbia a five on the ninth, but preserved its lead with a well-shot two on the 10th.

Mabey had to be good on a draw shot to collect two on the ninth to tie the game at 7-7. His draw to shot on the 10th—the winning rock—also was a neat effort considering the pressure.

EARNED HALF MILLION

CLEVELAND (AP)—Carmen Basilio, one of the most popular modern era champions, rules a solid 13-to-5 favorite to whip Johnny Saxton, a hit-and-run artist, in defense of his world welterweight title at the Cleveland Arena tonight.

The third meeting between these contrasting 147-pounders is expected to draw a crowd of 9,000. The 15-round match will be carried on network radio and television.

Basilio claims the damaged right hand that forced postponement from the original Jan. 18 date has completely healed. In any event, the champ's best punch is a solid left hook for he is a converted southpaw.

In their first fight March 14 Saxton gained a unanimous but widely hooped decision. It was the second time Saxton had won the title.

Basilio, who admitted he was below par at Chicago due to a bout of flu, won back his crown Sept. 12 at Syracuse, N.Y. with a deadly punching barrage that gave him a technical knockout in 1:31 of the ninth round.

"I tried to fight the fans' fight," Saxton explained in his dressing room. "They don't want you to run."

Saxton insists he won't make the same mistake again. "I don't care what the papers or the fans say
