Trotters And Saints Win City League Hoop Games

The Sport Lodge Trotters ran their unbeaten streak to eleven games last night by dumping the second place Nomads 69-56 in a City League basketball game at the Queen Charlotte High School.

The Second Saints continued their winning ways in the City League by turning back the Y.M.C.A. Celtics 86-31 in another league game.

The Trotters led all the way in their win over the Nomads. The scores by quarters were 21-11, 32-27, 49-48 and 69-56.

The league leaders piled up their points during the first and last quarters with the Nomads showing stronger during the second and third quarters.

Big Donnie MacLean led the Trotters with a 19 point performance and he was ably supported by Walter LePage, Kip Ready and Wendell Gillis. Ready, a sophomore player, scored 17 points. The veteran LePage connected for 16 points and Gillis raked up 14. Irving MacKinnon rounded out the winners' scoring with three points.

George Scantlebury and Keith Dalziel were the big guns for the Nomads. Scantlebury led all players with 24 points and MacGuigan

was runner-up with 20. Keith Dalziel scored six points while Freddy Driscoll, Hilson Carr and Carlyle MacDonald each had two.

Referee Earl Nicholson handed out 28 fouls in the roughly played game with the Trotters drawing 18 and the Nomads 10.

Dave Arnold scored 27 points as he topped all scorers in the Saints' win over the Celtics. Teammate Fearon had 24 points while Morrison had 17. George MacGuigan and Bernie MacDonald each scored six points for S. D. U. and E. MacDonald and Kelly had two.

Jackie Turner was high scorer for the Celtics with 10 points. J. MacDonald had seven and Earl Shephard five.

Sugar Ray To Meet Tiger Jones In Scrap Tonight

CHICAGO (AP)—Sugar Ray Robinson, the erstwhile song-and-dance man, tries to step up the tempo of his ring comeback tonight against crowding Ralph (Tiger) Jones.

The 10-rounder at Chicago Stadium is Robinson's second start in two weeks, his television bout (10 p. m. EST-CTS) in almost three years. Jones will weigh about 158 and Robinson around 157.

Sugar Ray is a 3-to-1 favorite to fashion victory No. 2 since forsaking a 30-month stage career in which the glitter, or gold, or both, failed to satisfy the abdicated world middleweight champion and former welter king.

KO'ED RINDONE
Robinson, 34, launched his comeback Jan 5 with a sixth-round knockout over plodding Joe Rindone at Detroit.

Robinson, who figures to collect \$12,000 tonight— including \$4,000 TV-radio fee—can hit the big-money class again if he handles Jones as expected.

The International Boxing Club has a Feb. 23 date in mind for Robinson against former welterweight king, Kid Gavilan, at Miami. This bout would be a real grudge battle, since both had been estranged for each other while Robinson ruled as welter king from late 1947 until Feb. 14, 1951 when he kayoed Jake La Motta in 13 for the 160 title.

Boxing Easier For Sugar Ray

CHICAGO (AP)—Sugar Ray Robinson finds boxing is easier work and pays better, than being a song and dance man.

Although the former welterweight and middleweight titleholder is far from broke, he can use more money just like any boxer else, says Joe Glaser. And that's mainly why Robinson is attempting a comeback at the age of 34 to regain his 160-pound crown from Bobo Olson.

Glaser, a dapper, gray-haired little man who was a fight manager in his early Chicago days, is what you might call Robinson's personal business manager.

Glaser thinks fight fans will be pleasantly surprised to find Robinson is about the same magnificent boxer and puncher that he was several years ago when he is tested by Ralph (Tiger) Jones in Chicago Stadium Wednesday night.

The 10-rounder will be televised starting at 10 p. m. EST and will give armchair fans their first look at Robinson in nearly three years.

Reveal Plans For Ladies' Golf Union Tourney

TORONTO (CP)—Junior team matches and a junior championship will be part of the 1955 championships of the Canadian Ladies' Golf Union in Victoria Aug. 8-13, the golf union announced Tuesday.

"During the last two years, Junior team matches have proved that in each province there are numbers of junior golfers of sufficient high standard to warrant inter-provincial junior team matches," officials said.

Because of this, the golf union has decided to start junior inter-provincial team matches with two juniors from each provincial branch competing.

The Junior team matches are to be held Aug. 4 and 5 and the junior championship Aug. 5 and 6.

The 42nd women's open will be held all during the week, preceded by the 21st women's close championship, a 54-hole medal event, Aug. 4-6. Interprovincial team matches will take place Aug. 4 and 5.

All will be played at the Royal Colwood Golf and Country Club.

U. S. Football Coach Worried By Canadians

PHILADELPHIA (CP)—Philadelphia Eagles coach Jim Trimble says he is worried about the interest that owners of Canadian football teams display in American stars.

Trimble returned Monday from the west coast where he coached the east team in the pro bowl game. "Why, it seemed like there were more Canadians at the game than Americans," he said.

Didn't Break World Indoor High Jump Record

NEW YORK (AP)—Herm Wyatt didn't set a new world indoor high jump record after all at the Boston Knights of Columbus games secretary Dan Ferris of the National AAU said Tuesday.

Wyatt, former San Jose state athlete now training with the armed forces track team for the Pan-American games in Mexico City in March, leaped six feet, 10 inches Saturday at Boston Garden.

It was listed as a world record, although several questioned it at the time.

At Tuesday's New York Track Association luncheon Ferris admitted the error after checking the records.

Navy Lt. Ken Wiesner in March of 1953 jumped six feet, 10 1/4 inches at the Chicago relays. Ferris Saturday said Wiesner had never applied for recognition of the record, as required.

Ferris checked, however, and said Tuesday that through a clerical error the Chicago mark was not credited in the record book. He said Wiesner had asked recognition and the AAU had approved his 6:10 1/4 record in 1953.

Frigon Injured In Second

Islanders Retain Lead With 12-7 Win Over Ramblers

The Charlottetown Islanders, dressing only eleven men, including their sub-goalie Frank Roper, got back to their winning ways last night with a 12-7 triumph over the Amherst Ramblers which bounces them back into sole possession of first place in the ACSHL once again. Wimpy Jones, Lorne Hennessey and Hughie Campbell all had braces for the Islanders while Bob Gray, Buck Whitlock, Bobby Dowling, Steve Brklacich, Ray Leduc and Vip Palladino each had singletons. For the Ramblers former Islander Paul Saindon had a hat-trick, Dave Kiley had a brace while Henri Therrien and Emmett Kennedy collected one each.

Almost everything that can possibly happen in a hockey game happened in the match at the Forum last evening. The Islanders took a 3-1 lead shortly after the second period started and at the time the goal was scored, Islanders' Danny O'Connor and Amherst goalie Bob Frigon tangled in a wild fist-swinging duel in front of the Amherst cage. When the fracas was finally stopped, Frigon found himself with a fast swelling eye and a bad headache. He appeared to be alright and ready to resume cage duty when he and Jackie Schmidt suddenly left for the dressing-room. They were followed by Shermie White and several other players.

The referees, Jim Mitchell of Amherst and Gordon Kelly of Summerside, went to the Amherst dressing-room to try to find out what was going on. The Ramblers informed them that they were changing goalies. So after a 20-minute delay, the Ramblers re-

turned to the ice with Frigon in a 4-1 edge followed by a goal by Emmett Kennedy. The Islanders followed in quick succession with goals by Hughie Campbell, Lorne Hennessey and Bobby Dowling and as the period ended held a commanding 9-2 lead.

Coach Steve Brklacich, sure of an easy win, iced only nine men in the finale, giving Ray Leduc, Buck Whitlock and Orin Carver the one period rest. Before the 7 minute mark of the period, the Islanders held a 12-2 lead on goals by Bob Gray, Vip Palladino and Wimpy Jones. The Islanders started to take it easy and Paul Saindon pumped in his hat-trick and Dave Kiley his brace in the final half-session of the match.

The Islanders were without the services of goalie Jim Shirley who is out with a groin injury, Lloyd Hinchberger, recovering from an attack of the flu, Copper Leyte, nursing his left foot after an operation and Wally Kullman who is at his home in Kitchener, Ontario. If everything goes as planned, the Islanders will be at full strength for their next match, the battle against the runner-up Moncton Hawks at the Forum next Friday night. It was learned from coach Brklacich after the game that the Hawks will be in the Hub City this evening it will mean that the Friday game will be a battle for first place and should be the best in hockey with both teams meeting for the first time, each having a complete line-up.
