Havre Enroute To Newport Following Visit To S'Side

SUMMERSIDE — The U.S.S. Havre, a patrol craft escort training ship was due to leave Summerside this morning at 6.00 o'clock bound for Newport, R. I. After spending the weekend tied up at Railway Wharf here.

The Havre is a training ship of the Great Lakes Naval Reserve training squadron and is based at Trenton Harbour Michigan. Her primary role is anti-submarine work but she is also equipped to perform amphibious control ship duties.

She was originally designed as a minesweeper but the pressing need for anti-submarine ships necessitated her being used as a patrol craft. Her peacetime complement is four officers and 34 men but she also has aboard five officers and 26 men of the naval reserve who are taking two weeks training during the present cruise.

The Havre was accompanied from Trenton Harbour by two other escort ships of the same type, the Worland which went on to Charlottetown and the Lamar which put in at Pictou.

The ship displaces 897 tons, is 104 feet in length with a 33-foot beam. She was commissioned in February 1944 and following her shakedown and first training

Bulgarian Gets Another Push Down The Hill

LONDON (AP)—Radio Moscow said Saturday former Soviet premier Nikolai Bulganin had been removed from the Soviet Communist party Praesidium.

The broadcast also said the 21st Communist party congress will be held Jan. 27, 1958.

The two decisions, to drop Bulganin and to hold the party congress, were reached Friday during a central committee meeting of the Communist party of the Soviet Union, the broadcast said.

Bulganin was ousted last March 27 as premier and replaced by Nikita Khrushchev, Soviet Communist party boss.

Four days later it was reported he had been made chairman of the state bank with cabinet rank, listed 44th among the 60 members of the new council of ministers.

In June he dropped out of sight but Khrushchev said Bulganin had undergone a serious operation and would return to work in a week.

Last Aug. 15 he was demoted again, named chairman of the council of the national economy
