HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says an intense disturbance off the Carolina coast is moving towards the Maritimes and could bring several more inches of snow and also some rain to the southern regions today and to northern New Brunswick tonight.

Regional forecasts: Halifax and vicinity, Annapolis Valley, Northern Nova Scotia, Eastern Shore; Overcast; intermittent snow becoming more continuous in afternoon; mild; light winds increasing to east 20 in afternoon. Low-high at Halifax 28 and 33, Kentville 22 and 30, New Glasgow 20 and 25, Guysboro 20 and 30. Cape Breton; Overcast; snow occasionally mixed with rain; mild; light winds increasing to east 20 by afternoon. Low-high at Yarmouth 30 and 32. Prince Edward Island; Overcast of snow beginning in afternoon; mild; light winds. Low-high at Charlottetown 15 and 25.

Eastern N.B. counties, Lower St. John River Valley; Mostly overcast; intermittent snow becoming more continuous in afternoon; mild; light winds increasing to east 20 by evening. Cape Breton; Overcast with intermittent snow; mild; light winds. Low-high at Moncton 15 and 25, Fredericton 15 and 25, Saint John 15 and 25.

Upper St. John River Valley, Bay of Chaleur; Cloudy with a few snowflurries and a few clear periods; mild; light winds. Low-high at Edmundston 5 and 15, Campbellton 20 and 15. Bay of Fundy; Light winds increasing to east 30 by evening; mostly overcast with intermittent snow; periods of mist; visibility six miles lowering in snow and mist to two miles and occasionally to one-half mile; temperatures near 30.
