TRICKS OF ROAD OVERSEERS.

To the Editor of the Examiner. Sir—Can you inform the public through the medium of your valuable journal, whose duty it is to supply the Road Overseers with blank forms of certificates, as required by the Act, to be furnished to persons who have performed their Statute Labor; and also if the Act says anything respecting the charge of threepence for said certificate, which amount has been demanded by an Overseer on Lot 19? By answering the above quest on you will much oblige me who work on the roads. A SUBSCRIBER. [It is the duty of the Road Correspondent in Charlotteville to furnish the blank forms of certificate, which the Overseers are bound to give the workers on the roads, or pay a fine in every case of refusal. The law does not authorize the Overseer to charge the Statute laborer 3d. for his certificate; but the Overseer is allowed to retain 3d. for each certificate out of the commutation money. If any Overseer charges any person 3d. for his certificate, he commits a fraud, and should be exposed and punished. We have lately heard that an Overseer, of well known liberal principles, in a certain part of Queen's County to the Westward, applied to the proper officer for the blank forms of certificates, and was refused them, while he saw Tory Overseers in other directions supplied with them. It is quite easy to understand this trick. Where there is likely to be a majority of Liberal voters under the Franchise Act, every difficulty must be put in the way of their getting certificates, so that many of their votes may be cut off as an election; and where the franchise voters are likely to give their support to the Tory interest, every facility will be given to supply them with certificates. We sincerely trust that we may be informed of every case, particularly described, of fraud and rascality in this matter. If we cannot take the necessary steps to stop the injustice while the present Government lasts, we can, at all events, expose it, and call down the public shame upon the perpetrators. It is just as we expected. The Act passed in the Session of 1860, to give the Road Overseers the power of controlling the elective franchise, was clearly intended to still, as much as possible, the expression of public opinion at the hustings, and thereby give the Tories a chance of retaining their ill-gotten offices after another election.—EDITOR EXAMINER.]

To the Editor of the Examiner. Sir.—In the last *Islander* I observe that the Editor, like his masters in the Government, feels that unless he can keep up religious prejudices his and their power will soon be gone. Hence every week are poured forth from the three papers supporting the Government the most vile and false statements against the Liberal party, with the view of making the Protestant believe that if the Liberals came into power the Catholics would have the ascendancy, and the Protestant religion would suffer. If the Government, however, think that through their Secretary they can make any inroad on the Liberal Protestants in my district, both them and their Secretary must show a little more sincerity on the Land Question, and not by a false statement about road money try to work up the worst of feelings that can be excited in any country, and that to perpetuate the most deceptive Government that ever existed in any of the Colonies. Some time since, in reply to the very just observations of Mr. Irving, who was near losing his son by the careless firing of ignorant fellows appearing to be soldiers, the Adjutant General published a reply that the Volunteers only got the use of the rifles on public occasions. I beg leave to remark that if such an order has been given, it has never been observed in Cassepaup, as some half-blind idiot, from a low height's corner called Cassepaup, has been firing off rifles on all occasions and at all hours, to the no small annoyance of the intelligent and sober part of the community. As an example of the reckless firing of these fools, on Monday, 1st instant, Doctor O'Leary, of this place, was in charge of a patient delivered of an infant the day before at Cassepaup Cross Roads, when suddenly his patient was thrown into convulsions by a number of shots fired at a dog, and the yelling of the dog (the patient being afraid it was her own daughter, a little girl between three and four years of age, who had gone out a little before the dog was shot). On Doctor O'Leary going out to ascertain the cause of such firing around the house of a person just confined, he met some topers armed with the public rifles, and was stiffly informed by a person named Hugh Forsyth that he got and kept the public rifle he held in his hand to mind his sheep, and would use it to hunt any dog that would run after or look cross at his sheep, &c. Now, Mr. Editor, without entering into the question of whether a person is justified in quietly following a dog for nearly two miles and watching and reporting all the dog's manoeuvres, and then shooting him in the most public and crowded place for miles around, just at the length of the house of a person confined of a child the day before, and bringing a whole crowd of persons with rifles to shoot one dog, which one shot would have—I publicly demand if the Government

LATE COLONIAL INTELLIGENCE.

NOVA SCOTIA. A SEIZURE.—On Tuesday last a schooner arrived at this port from P. E. Island, having on board some 350 bottles of rum and gin packed in bulk. The object of importing liquor in this way is evidently to evade the law, by enabling the importer to offer the article for sale in the "original package." It was found, however, that the attempt, ingenious as it is, will not succeed, and the whole lot has been very properly seized by order of the Board of Revenue. There is no doubt that importation in this way is contrary to the spirit, if not to the letter of the law.—*Pictou Eastern Courier*.

The man-of-war steamer *Firebrand* arrived here on Friday last, from the West Indies, with yellow fever on board. Sixteen of the crew died before the arrival of the vessel at this port, and since she has been in harbor a number of others have died. On Saturday last, we are informed, there were eight deaths. The crew have been taken ashore to the Commissioner's house in the dockyard.—*Halifax Express*.

NEW BRUNSWICK. THE FISH TRADE OF BAY CHALEUR.—A memorial was lately addressed to the Canadian Minister of Finance, by the two great fishery establishments, of Messrs. Charles Robin & Co., and LeBoutillier Bros., of Gaspe, Bay Chaleur. It states that Messrs. Robin & Co., employ 3,500 men in their fishery operations! That in 1859 they exported to foreign markets 39,000 quintals of codfish, 20,916 gallons, (83 tons) fish oil and 22 barrels salmon. These gentlemen build all their own ships at Paspébiac, where 60 sail have been launched solely for the fish trade, and they have at present 18 of these afloat, manned by 150 men, besides 164 large fishing boats. Messrs. LeBoutillier Bros. have 12 ships of their own in the fish trade, manned by 90 men in the fisheries alone. In 1859 they reported—23,400 quintals dry codfish, 2530 blis. pickled herrings, 40 do. salmon, 159 quintals green codfish, 23,000 gallons oil. These gentlemen have acquired immense wealth from the fish trade as the fruit of their industry and enterprise.—*Col. Times*.

NEWFOUNDLAND. The steamer *Merlin* arrived this morning from St. John's, N. F., via Sydney. Among the passengers were General Trollope, Major Percy, and Dr. Hunt. Business generally was very dull at St. John's. The *Commercial Journal* cannot report very satisfactorily of the progress of the fishery in the neighbourhood of St. John's. Both fish and bait were said to be abundant, but the weather had been too fine for macking good work. Reports from Green Bay were unfavorable, but from the Westward cheering accounts had been received. The Election Committee of the House of Assembly have reported in favor of Messrs. Byrnes and Nolan, as members for Harbor Main. Both gentlemen were sworn in. The Legislature was prorogued on the 25th of June. General Trollope visited Conception Bay on an important mission. He took occasion to review the Harbor Grace Militia, of whom he speaks pleasingly. The troops at St. John's were also reviewed by the General.
