

New Manager For Prince County Hospital Approved

The appointment of Mr. J. M. Levan, Summerside as manager of Prince County Hospital was approved by the Board of Trustees at their regular monthly meeting last week.

Mr. Levan will succeed Mr. John Ledgerwood, who resigned as administrator several weeks ago and will shortly take over his position as administrator of the Soldier's Memorial Hospital, at Campbellton, N. B.

The highest occupancy in the history of the hospital, recorded in January and February was reported by Mr. Ledgerwood, with the average daily occupancy for this period being 87 adults and children.

The number of available beds at the chronic care unit has also been increased and occupancy there also shows an upward trend.

Because of the increased occupancy at Prince County Hospital for the two-month period the deficit for that time is considerably less than for the same period last year, Mr. Ledgerwood stated.

Speaking of Dr. P. A. Creelman, director of the Division of T.B. control and Medical Superintendent of the Provincial Sanatorium, Dr. Bonnell said:

"Dr. Creelman came to the province as Chest Diagnostician in 1929, and in addition, served for the next two years as Chief Health Officer. He was mainly responsible for arousing public interest which resulted in the opening of the Provincial Sanatorium in 1931 and its expansion some years later.

"Through his untiring efforts toward the control of tuberculosis over the succeeding twenty-five years, the diagnostic and treatment facilities provided were brought to a point where they equal or surpass those available in any other part of Canada. The progress made in the control of this disease will remain a lasting monument to his devotion to public health."

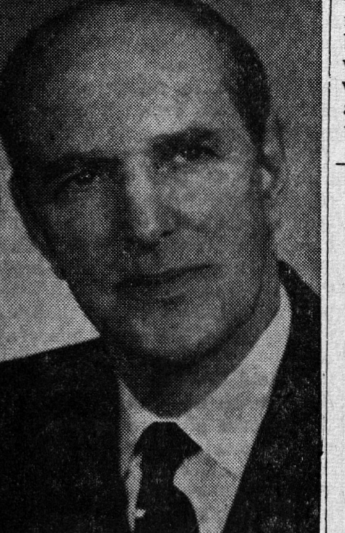

lowing his special training in Pathology, he served in the Canadian Army from 1940 to 1946 and then returned to set up the Division of Laboratories with the Department of Health.

"He was made Chairman of the Provincial Health Planning Commission which was established to study the health needs of the province in 1948, and through his efforts, maximum utilization of the Federal Health Grants was accomplished. As part of the overall plan for improved health services, Dr. Shaw was responsible for establishing and staffing a central reference laboratory to serve all physicians and hospitals in the province, and also for bringing the services available through the hospital laboratories to an acceptable level.

"His judgment in all health matters was most highly regarded both provincially and
