

UNEMPLOYMENT DEBATE SPARKS MOTION OF NON-CONFIDENCE IN FEDERAL GOV'T

OTTAWA, (CP)—Two opposition parties Tuesday called for the overthrow of the federal government because of rising unemployment.

As the Commons opened a major unemployment debate, the Progressive Conservatives moved a motion of want-of-confidence in the government and the CCF promptly approved the resolution.

Labor Minister Gregg denied that the government situation is deteriorating, as Progressive Conservatives contended. Admitting the number of jobless is up from a year ago, he said the increase is due mostly to growth in the labor force and that the number at work increased in the last published figures.

Mr. Gregg also said the federal government is willing, at the coming federal-provincial conference, to discuss the problem of taking care of able-bodied jobless who are without unemployment insurance.

NO REQUESTS The central government is prepared to do this, he said, if the provinces request it. So far, the provinces had done so, though it was primary responsibility of the provinces.

Earlier in Tuesday's sitting, Prime Minister St. Laurent said he looks for such a conference "as early as it can conveniently be arranged" and that he expects to communicate within the next week with the premiers.

The unemployment discussion—regarded as the top domestic affairs debate of the parliamentary session to date—developed from figures released by the government last week showing jobless at a post-war high.

The bureau of statistics estimated 362,000 persons were out of work and looking for jobs in late January, compared with the previous high of 315,000 last March. At the same time, 569,582 persons were looking for work through National Employment Service, against the high of 569,996 in March, 1954.

LACK OF PLANNING Mrs. Ellen Fairclough (PC—Hamilton West), Progressive Conservative opposition critic who proposed the no-confidence motion, accused the government of "lack of constructive planning" on employment.
