Charlottetown yachtsmen had their own share of difficulties on their start for the Shediac Regatta Wednesday morning. Skipper K. M. Martin and his crew of 12 Sea Rovers after putting out at 6 o'clock in the morning on their 32-foot auxiliary schooner "Bounty" had to be picked up by the Brant off St. Peter's Island and taken back to Charlottetown where they left again on the Brant about 9 o'clock.

"Strongly" Fascist

MONTREAL, Aug. 2—Peter Bercovitch, Liberal member of Parliament for Montreal Carier and a leader in the Montreal Jewish community in a statement today branded as "strongly Fascist" a plan outlined at Ste. Agathe Des Monts, Que., to keep property in the Laurentian Mountains town out of Jewish hands.

(At Ste. Agathe Des Monts, Que., J. B. Bazinet, parish priest, said today a committee is being formed "to keep a hand on the tie of property." The priest said the committee "will try as much as possible to keep the property out of Jewish hands because we want to keep it as much as possible a community for our own people." Mr. Bazinet said that there was "no Fascist tendency in the district.")

"The whole plan as set out by him (Mr. Bazinet) for the organization of a committee to decide who may or may not become a purchaser of property, as part of an anti-racial movement, is strongly Fascist," said Mr. Bercovitch. "So too is the technique of acting Fascist whilst denying Fascist motivation."

Book Club News
Features Work
By Mr. Scheinfeld

Featured prominently in the current Book-of-the-Month Club News is a review of Mr. Amram Scheinfeld's new book, "You and Heredity," of which 115,000 copies have been taken by the Book-of-the-Month Club for distribution to its members in September. Concurrently, the publishers, F. G. Stokes and New York, are issuing 16,000 for general sale. The book is also being published in England under the sponsorship of Professor Huxley's interesting career is thus described by George Stevens in the Book-of-the-Month Club News:

"Amram Scheinfeld became interested in heredity as a result of a newspaper assignment. In 1926 he began a series of short daily 'profiles' of prominent men, which he wrote and illustrated. After a year or so of meeting politicians, judges, movie and theatrical producers, educators, financiers, and sportsmen, and embalming them in tabloid biographies, he began to think along analytical lines of the factors involved in achievement, of the roles of heredity and environment. At first he planned to write a novel on the theme of heredity, but the more he read on the subject the deeper his interest became. He studied systematically as the New School for Social Research and at New York University; and in the course of exhausting a large bibliography on heredity and genetics, he became convinced that no single book existed answering the layman's question in this complicated field in the terms the layman could understand. A literary discovery was the germ-cell of his book, 'You and Heredity' it developed, since 1935, to the exclusion of Mr. Scheinfeld's other activities.

Has Many Interests

"These other activities have been various and prolific, the marks of a versatile man who can keep half a dozen balls in the air, or iron in the fire, at once. Besides his series of newspaper interviews, you have probably seen more than one comic strip drawn—but not necessarily signed—by Scheinfeld, and nationally syndicated; you may have seen his literary cartoons in 'The Saturday Review'; read articles by him in 'The Saturday Evening Post', and foreign correspondence he wrote for one of the news services. He has been a reporter in Milwaukee, written editorials and drawn political cartoons for a newspaper in Baltimore. And ever since was in the eighth grade, he has been as much time as he could spare from more profitable enterprises to the study of art.

"Amram Scheinfeld—his given name, he says, is not a mistaken spelling for Abram, but 'honest-goodness Old Testament,' and Exodus VI: 20 bears him out—was born in Louisville forty years ago. When he was five, his family moved to Milwaukee. A siege of diphtheria immediately followed by scarlet fever left him permanently underweight, hungry, and, apparently, talented—though presumably the author of 'You and Heredity' does not ascribe his artistic and literary aptitudes to environment alone. One very unusual factor, in any event, was his eighth-grade teacher, a Miss Frahm, who actually and incredibly encouraged him to draw cartoons during class and pass them around among the pupils.

Art Studies

"After high school he wanted to study art. This made a conventional college education impossible, so he went to the University of Milwaukee Free Press, fortunately under an arrangement that gave him time to follow his studies according to a plan of his own. During leaves of absence he took extension courses in literature from the University of Wisconsin, also studied art first in Milwaukee and then in Chicago.

He was turned down for war service because of poor eyesight and underweight that had resulted from his childhood illness. On the newspaper he did every kind of job: reporter, feature writer, rewrite man, Sunday editor, and even, for a brief turn, columnist. It was through his newspaper experience that he became interested in social problems which in turn contributed to his curiosity about heredity; he did a series of articles on prison conditions and another on narcotic addicts, and conducted a 'Baby Welfare' campaign in which thousands of Wisconsin babies were subjected to health examinations.

Returns to Writing

"In 1923 he moved East, and his multifarious activities, already listed in part, began to exfoliate. As cartoonist and feature writer, he had a steady syndicate job for several years; he left in 1928 to study art in Paris, and later in London. The principal accomplishment of my European stay, he writes, 'was to clarify my mind as to what I wanted to do. I was definitely sure now that while I would like to paint and draw for diversion, my work so far as I could control it would be that of studying and writing about human beings and human problems.' So he returned to America as a free-lance writer and plunged into the course of study that led to his book on heredity—one of the principal satisfactions of my European stay, he writes, 'was to clarify my mind as to what I wanted to do.
