HOT WEATHER

AT MANILA

Is Affecting The United States Troops.

THE REBELS ARE CONCENTRATING NEAR PASIG RIVER

The Americans will not pay the \$20,000,000 to Spain.

MANILA, Feb. 20.—The heat is very oppressive to-day.

The troops, especially those compelled to work in the open have been affected.

It will probably be warmer from now until the rainy season.

The rebels have been concentrating south of the Pasig River, in front of Brigadier-General Otis' lines on right all day long.

Scouts report that the rebels are apparently coming from Taguna and from the Cavat provinces.

Halifax men are seeking capital in New York to carry on a pulp mill at Parraboro.

Father Fallon, of Ottawa, has been reproving the young people of his congregation because of the small number of marriages that take place among them.

The head offices of the Canadian Life Insurance Company are to be removed from Hamilton to Toronto on account of high taxation in Hamilton.

A new daily has been established in Victoria, B. C., to represent true Liberalism and to protest against the racialities of the "new Liberalism." It holds that all the commandments should be observed.

Truth, of London says that Emperor William has written a letter to Queen Victoria, announcing that he will arrive at Cowes, Isle of Wight, on board the imperial yacht Hohenzollern on July 29th, and that he will remain at Cowes for one week.

Count Tolstoi's new book, the proceeds of which will be devoted to the Dukhobor settlements in Canada, is entitled, "The Resurrection." The novel is strong in human study, with a central problem. Experts speak of it as the most vivid piece of literature that has ever come from Tolstoi's pen.

Uncle Sam has a new method of increasing the revenues from his postal service that is worthy of the consideration of "I. William." He has decided to make up 50,000 complete sets of newspaper and periodical stamps and sell them at \$5 a set, each set containing stamps of the following denominations: 1, 2, 5, 10, 25, and 50 cents, and 2, 5, 10, 25, and 100 dollars. Mr. Mulock has already done a good deal for the philatelists, and here is a chance for him to do something more, and perhaps augment the falling revenues of his department.

Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal has given public testimony of his faith in Miss Flora Shaw by presiding at a crowded meeting of the Royal Colonial Institute, held on purpose to hear her account of the conditions in Klondike. Miss Shaw does not withdraw an inch from the position she has taken. She says plainly that the Government regulations and other conditions are of a stultifying description; but while the temporary conditions are bad, the permanent ones are good. In other words, nature put the gold there, and Mr. Sifton put obstacles in the way of getting it out.

A FARMER

Advises a Charlottetown Doctor

SIR,—I have been looking over an address given by a Charlottetown M. D., before the Local Council of Women, and am very sorry to have to say that disease and death may be expected in a city in which a medical man will venture to get off statements which a small amount of enquiry would have convinced him to be untrue of any part of Europe or America, and still more false when applied to the cattle of this Province.

The Dominion Minister of Agriculture has had a paid agent visiting every part of this Province for a year or more and he has not found one milk cow, heifer or steer in one thousand affected by tuberculosis. The report says: "Here the Dr. gave statistics, first under present conditions more than half the cows after three years of age are doomed to tuberculosis, that is soon as they become useful for breeding and dairy purposes." He then goes on to tell of an instance where 54 per cent passed the tuberculin test, and a lot more undigested and unproved assertions, which to those who have taken the trouble of thoroughly studying that terrible disease, reads more like rant than sober statements.

The doctor very properly says that dust in the dwelling-house, in the shop, the street, the church or lecture room is a source of danger to men and women. But when he refers to infants he forgets that they also have lungs and must inhale their dose of dust as well as the big doctor. So he heeds at our most useful, gentle friend poor "Bossie," and says more than half of all milk cows are doomed to the tuberculosis. I advise the doctor wake up and forget what he read on the subject of tuberculosis five years ago and make himself acquainted with the more modern discoveries about that disease, and he will find that when infection is taken into the stomach it is other parts of the system it attacks, not the lungs.

It is much to be feared that it is the need of cows milk that causes sickness and death among infants and older people too. What Charlottetown wants is, doctors who will advise their patients, and their friends to drink all the fresh new milk they can buy, borrow, beg or steal.

It is infamous this ignorant warfare against the cow. Of all the useful noble animals God has given to man, none surpass the cow in healthful life giving qualities. And her own helpfulness is greater than any other animal. She is less afflicted by Tuberculosis than any other living creature. And when it does attack her, the probability is that it was one of the doctor's patients who infected her.

Let the doctors study up the reports of the Dominion veterinary surgeons and he will discover that an apology from him is due to the cattle owners of this province. What the people of Charlottetown badly need is more milk farms and fewer beer or and grog shops. More careful study of life and what, it is, and less hobby-riding. The doctor who would advise all sorts of people to sleep with their windows open, when great numbers are certain to get too much cold air should take a trip to the Klondike for the benefit of his Charlottetown supporters.

Perhaps the doctor thought he was only talking to a few ladies, who would drink down with unquestioning faith anything a doctor says. If so, he should have had the reporter turned out before getting off such a pack of rot.
