### Ten Years of Electricity.

THE MARVELOUS PROGRESS SHOWN IN A SINGLE DECADE.  
(From Electricity.)  
Just ten years ago—August, 1882—the first central station for commercial incandescent lighting was established, and arc lighting was beginning to assume its present form; yet a single decade has seen the use of electric light and power advance from the experimental stage to the very front ranks of industrial enterprise. The most recent estimate of the capital invested in the electrical industries in the United States is \$700,000,000, and of this amount \$350,000,000 represents the proportion which electric lighting and power have attained; \$100,000,000 is also the estimated investment in electrical supplies, of which the electric lighting and railway appliances constitute a large proportion.

The influence which the Edison and Thomson-Houston companies exerted in the development of the electrical industry will be further appreciated if we consider that slow progress made in this branch of science previous to the time of their organization. The telegraph was at that time almost the only application to which electricity had been adapted, and although electric lighting by means of the voltaic arc had been accomplished by Sir Humphrey Davy as early as 1810 by means of a battery of 3,000 cells, it was not until 1867, when Dr. Siemens announced his invention of the self-exciting dynamo that material progress towards the science of electric lighting was made.

At the Paris exhibition of 1878 the system of electric lighting invented by Jablochhoff, by means of which several of the streets of Paris were lighted by electricity, proved an incentive to inventors which resulted in the production of the modern type of arc lamp, which was in a comparatively experimental stage at the time of the organization of the American electric company of New Britain. The incandescent lamp had received less attention at the hands of scientists than arc lamps when Edison announced his invention. The division of the electric current into small units had been a long standing problem before the scientist's of that day, but all the experiments previous to Edison's invention had been in the direction of a filament of low resistance, which obviously required a prohibitive amount of copper to conduct the current for a few lamps, even over short distances. The invention of a high resistance filament marked the turning point in the history of incandescent electric lighting. Thus we see that the whole of this great industry has practically come into existence within a single decade. The men who have been making history at such a rapid rate have been engrossed with the present and the immediate future that they have little attention to the preservation of records, etc., that would not only be of interest, but of great practical value to the great army of young men who have taken up the science of electricity as a field for their life work. In the work on the Richmond road experiments were made with, perhaps, seventy five different designs for trolley. No memoranda or photographs were preserved, and not even Mr. Sprague himself can tell to-day just what a half dozen of them were. This is only one instance out of many where data have been irretrievably lost.

### General Telegraphic News.

BERMUDA, Aug. 23.—Pickford & Black's West India steamer Beta, from Halifax the 18th, arrived this morning, having encountered the full force of the hurricane which swept the seas on Saturday and Sunday. The Beta had two of her boats swept away, and one of the horses which she carried as part cargo, was killed. During a sudden lurch Capt. Smith was knocked down the companion way and injured, though his injuries are not considered serious.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 23.—The statement that there was a shortage of binder twine in Manitoba, published in the Winnipeg papers, turns out to be inaccurate. The failure of local dealers in Portage la Prairie to lay in a sufficient supply for the sudden heavy demand, gave rise to the statement. There is sufficient twine now in Winnipeg to supply the whole country, in fact more than will be required for this season's crop.

REGINA, N. W. T., Aug. 23.—The Legislative Assembly struck out the section of the school bill providing for the opening and closing of schools with prayer by a vote of 8 to 7. The kindergarten question was again taken up and discussed at length without any decision arrived at. It is proposed to raise the age of admittance to four years.

MONTREAL, Aug. 23.—P. A. Choquette, M. P. for Montmagny, has announced his intention of starting an agitation in favor of some private company purchasing the Intercolonial Railway. He states the service is shameful, that under its present system the road is not securing half the business it should, and that it is time the road was taken up by some company that would make it pay.

LONDON, Aug. 23.—Edmund Yates, in the World to-day, says General Sir Frederick Ponsonby, Queen's private secretary, in conveying to Gladstone Her Majesty's command to form a ministry, stipulated that Labouchere should not be selected to fill any post in the government. Labouchere, the World adds, was implored to get Gladstone out of the difficulty by writing a letter declaring he would not accept office, as he wished to remain independent. This, Labouchere declined to do. Overtures have since been made to him to accept the revised title of his uncle, Baron Taunton.

ST. JOHN, Aug. 23.—The second harvest excursion via the C. P. R. to the Canadian Northwest passed through here this morning, the cars being crowded. Additions will be made to the party in Quebec and Ontario, and it is expected there will be between 500 and 700 on board by the time Winnipeg is reached. Word comes from the west that harvesting operations have commenced and that large numbers of men are wanted. The next harvest excursion takes place Sept. 5th.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 23.—Over 500 miners and suspects and citizens have been arrested at Coal Creek and that vicinity; 150 are still held prisoners in a little church. The prison is close, hot and uncomfortable. Charges of murder in the first degree, manslaughter, carrying concealed weapons and rioting will be preferred against the most aggressive of the miners. Gen. Carnes will advise the Governor to call an extra session of the legislature for the purpose of ordering Anderson county under martial law.
