PRINCIPLE VS. PARTY.

Sir,—It is interesting to notice the ease and celerity with which politicians swallow their principles when the interest of their party is at stake. The latest exhibition of this "swallowing process" has been afforded us by some prominent members of the Order of Good Templars; and it is of interest just now to recall some facts in connection with this matter.

Two years ago, when it was rumored that the Peiers' Government were going to introduce a License Bill at the next session of the Legislature, the voice of the Good Templars was heard strongly condemning this prospective course of the Government and their lodge rooms and places of meeting rang with lengthy and indignant speeches in which the first principle of the Order, no license in any form, was eloquently proclaimed: and the foremost of those orators were Liberals.

Well Sir, Mr. Peters quailed before the expressed sentiment of the temperance party, and the embryo license bill was strangled.

And now we come to the session of our Legislature last spring, when our Premier introduced and passed a bill legalizing the sale of intoxicating liquors in order that he might clasp to his bosom that "blood money" which a year ago he would not touch with a pair of tongs.

The Grand Lodge of Good Templars met at Eldon in July last, and in one of the resolutions unanimously adopted by that body we find the following clause: "That this Grand Lodge in annual session re-affirm without the slightest qualification the principles decided on in 1852, to wit: 'No license in any form, under any circumstances, for the sale of liquors to be used as a beverage; and we consider the action of the Local Government in placing upon our Statute books (by a small fraction of the Legislature) a License Law for Charlottetown to be the greatest blow that could be given to Temperance Reform; and every member who voted for the measure deserves to be treated as an enemy of Prohibition.'"

And now comes the bye-elections in Belfast and Murray Harbor, when the Farquharson Government appears before the bar of public opinion to be judged—where do we find those Liberal Good Templars who so lately proclaimed a "License Law to be an outrage and insult to the people of the province." Do we find them assisting the Conservative party (whose representatives fought the License bill in the Legislature) to wipe out this "insult" by smashing the "rum government?" No sir, but instead, we see them swallowing their principles and striving to elect Mr. Irving—one of their number—to support license in the House of Assembly!

Mr. Editor, We have no quarrel with those "True Templars" who are just now indulging in the luxury of 'dieting on principle,' but we most emphatically protest against their brazen effrontery in going around dictating to us electors to vote grit, and thus support Farquharson and them in their hypocrisy. Sir, we will not do it; and the handsome majority which Mr. McLean will receive on the 13th,—besides being a tribute to that gentleman's ability and popularity, will also be an indignant protest against the gross hypocrisy of the grit party in this province.

Moun: Stewart Items

The farmers of this vicinity are about through hauling their produce. Owing to the very low prices not as much was done in shipping circles here as in former years. Farmers are beginning to realize here as in other sections that it is more remunerative to feed the raw products on the farm, thereby increasing the fertility of the soil, and as there is always a good market for the finished product—butter and cheese—the farmers can look in another direction for means of a livelihood, other than selling potatoes at sixteen cents per bushel.

The Mt. Stewart Dairying Co., is about setting up the business for the cheese-making season, which has been the most successful since its incorporation. The manager, Mr. John A. McDonald, has given satisfaction to all, and is a capable man in his profession. The butter-making bids fair to be a success this winter, as in addition to the milk supplied by their own patrons, a goodly lot is carried from the adjoining factories of Morell and East River.

Our local butchers, Messrs Coffin and Dunn, are doing a rushing business. The latter is about rearing a large establishment from Mr. Wm. Vickerson and will be better prepared than ever to supply the wants of his numerous customers.

The Mt. Stewart north and south schools are progressing very favorably under the careful management of Messrs Doyle and McDonald respectively.

The roads leading to and from Mt. Stewart are in a very bad condition. Mt. Stewart bridge is almost impassable, and persons passing over it at night are endangering their lives; it is high time for the people to wake up and see that the unpopular leader of our Local administration be driven out of power and a man who will look after the interests of his country be elected in his stead.

CHARLOTTETOWN MARKETS.

There are some oats coming in by rail, but few, if any, are coming by post road. The buyers are offering 28c for what are moving.

What potatoes are changing hands bring about 17c. But there are very few coming in, the shipping season for them being about over.

The price of dressed pork ranges from 4 to 4½c, according to quality; and for live hogs they are paying from 3½ to 4c at the factory.

Cheese is quoted at 11½c, but the product is about all shipped. There is a good demand for factory butter at 20c.

The egg season is about over. The dealers are paying 15½c for what hen-fruit is on sale.

Loss at Ladysmith.
