SLIGHT ACCIDENTS.—The heavy rain storm of Saturday last caused the newly filled waterworks trenches to cave in in some places. On Saturday night and last night these holes were the cause of some horses and pedestrians taking involuntary tumbles. But fortunately no one was seriously hurt.

ELOPED WITH A NEGRO.—Miss Lillian Dephley, of St. Paul, Minn., has eloped with her father's coachman, Wm. Stewart, a negro. Lillian is not yet 15 years old. Recently it was noticed that Stewart was a little too attentive to the girl and his services were dispensed with. On Monday evening Stewart and Miss Lillian disappeared.

ROUGH ON THE DOCTORS.—At the annual meeting of the Indiana Medical Society, a telegram was received, as follows:—"Sorry I cannot be there. May you and associates continue to take life easily as heretofore.—Bill Nye." This was received with great applause, which commenced as a murmur and increased to a roar—as the joke gradually percolated.

LARGE MACKEREL.—Mr. Rob Angus, Manager of the Telephone Company, had on exhibition at the Hotel Ross, on Wednesday evening, the largest mackerel ever caught here. It measured 2 1/2 inches in length, about 5 1/2 inches in width, and weighs 3 lbs. 6 oz. It was hooked at Tignish, by Capt. Frank Gallant. Mr. Angus intends to have it stuffed and sent to Washington, to show the Americans what kind of mackerel we get inside the three mile limit.—Agriculturist.

A NARROW ESCAPE.—What was very nearly a serious accident occurred in Purves & Warner's mill yesterday afternoon. Wm. S. Mullen, an employe, was passing one of the pulleys when his shirt sleeve caught in the belt, drawing him up to the beam, which he held on to until every stitch of clothing was stripped from his body, leaving nothing but his boots and hat. Strange to say, with the exception of a slight bruise on his chest, he escaped injury.—St. John Gazette.

ISLAND HORSES AND SHEEP.—Wednesday's steamer from Summerside to Point du Chene brought over three lots of lambs, in all about 500, and about a dozen horses. Yesterday's steamer brought another large lot of sheep and 11 horses. Four of the horses were purchased by Mr. Wood Avar, of Shediac, for R. C. Tait, for shipment to Bermuda. It was a choice lot, one a chestnut for which \$140 was paid, especially being admired. Mr. G. B. Bates, of Moncton, brought over a finely proportioned animal, an iron grey, and Mr. Amos Etter, of Amherst, also made a purchase.—Moncton Times.

A VALUABLE WIFE.—This is how the mathematical editor of the Sydney C. B. Reporter figures up the value of Mrs. Williams, of Portland, to her husband:—One Williams, of Portland, was possessed of a wife. The city workmen, in repairing the street removed the steps from the front door and laid a plank as an approach to the house. Mrs. Williams fell off the plank and was injured. Williams sued the city for the injuries, and two weeks' loss of his wife's society. At this rate, Mrs. Williams' society was worth over \$15,000 per year. Another question arises: suppose Mrs. Williams become involved, would this be an asset in the estate?

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Big Blaze.

BALTIMORE, Md., Sept. 2. A fire to-day destroyed nearly a block, causing a loss of \$150,000, and killing seven firemen. It broke out in Prior, Hilgenberg & Co.'s toy warehouse, and before the firemen could get to the block an explosion of fireworks wrecked the building, and caused the flames to spread with alarming rapidity to J. Wenkelman & Co.'s drug store on the north, and M. S. Levy & Co.'s house on the south. Scarcely had the firemen entered the drug store when the inside of the building seemed suddenly to drop in. A terrific explosion followed and the immense building collapsed. The entire block running over from Lombard to Pratt Streets was burned. At the drug store holes were cut through the pavement and every effort made to reach the imprisoned men, but only one escaped.

The "Standard's" Opinion.

LONDON, Sept. 3. The Standard, in a savage leader, on the fisheries question, says: "It will be well for the President and Government of the United States to remember that Canada is a dependency of Great Britain, and that if the necessity should unfortunately arise, she has behind her guns and ironclads. If the American cousins fail to understand this allusion, if in deference to the tone of coarse brutality which seems to be a distinguishing feature of their domestic politics, they invite us to reply to their insults in a strain they will comprehend, perhaps we may be allowed to remind them of the Trent affair."

Ottawa News.

OTAWA, Sept. 2. The Dominion Rifle Association matches commence to-morrow. The Nova Scotian and Island contingents are here, and the New Brunswick team will arrive to-morrow morning.

Hon. Mr. Foster is expected to-morrow, when a full cabinet meeting will be held, at which, it is understood, Newfoundland matters will be considered.

Hon. Mr. Tupper returned from Halifax to-day.

Another Banker Disappears. QUEBEC, Sept. 3. The disappearance from his post yesterday during business hours of Andre, receiving teller of the Bank Nationale, and the subsequent discovery that his cash was \$12,000 short, have caused a sensation in business, banking and society circles. He was an old employe, and up to the time of his disappearance, had the full confidence of all who knew him.

From Halifax. HALIFAX, Sept. 2. A sixteen-year-old son of John P. Chetwynd, a fish merchant, went bathing in North West Arm to-day and was drowned. Capt. Graham, who runs a ferry boat on Pictou harbor, fell over the wharf there while getting into his boat and was drowned. The bakers on Saturday put up the price of bread one cent a loaf owing to the rise of flour.

Wired From Winnipeg. WINNIPEG, Sept. 2. The bill to confirm the compact with the Northern Pacific Railway respecting the Red River Valley road, was read a third time and passed by the Local Legislature, which will prorogue to-morrow night. The American tug Gladiator has been seized by the Canadian authorities at Algonquin Mills, for towing a raft of logs in Canadian waters.

A Deadly Contest. KANSAS CITY, Mo., Sept. 3. The farmers and herdsmen of Paladoro lost many horses, and recently suspected a band of campers. Some 40 well armed vigilants surrounded the camp. A fight ensued; and in ten minutes seventeen men and horses were killed. The vigilants had three men killed and nine wounded.

Yellow Fever. JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Sept. 2. During the 24 hours ending 6 p. m., there were 24 new cases of fever and 2 deaths. The total number of cases to date is 258, and of deaths 34.

Another Cyclone. JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Sept. 4. A moderate cyclone passed over the city this afternoon, followed by a thunder storm and heavy rain, clearing the atmosphere and lowering the temperature.
