POTATOES FOR FOREIGN MARKETS.—Owen Connolly & Co. shipped to Belfast, Ireland, on the 3rd inst., 10,000 bushels of potatoes, per brig. *Canadian*. A cargo of potatoes was also shipped from Montague for Gloucester, U. S., on the 3rd inst.

FIRE.—We are informed that the fire in the millinery store of Messrs. W. A. Weeks & Co. on Saturday, did not catch from the boy's "carelessly throwing down a lighted match," as stated in the EXAMINER. It caught by the heat of the stove igniting some tissue paper and light millinery goods which hung near the stove.

ALBERT ALLIN was examined by the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon for breaking into and stealing from Mr. Kennedy's Confectionery. Allin was arrested by watchman Shea, who gave evidence against him. Mr. Shea said that at half-past four o'clock this morning he discovered a window open in the dining room of Mr. Kennedy's Confectionery. He went up to it and saw Allin inside, who hid as soon as he saw him (Shea.) He walked for some time, and Allin came to the window. The watchman helped him out. Shea whistled for the police. Officer Heartz arrived and took the prisoner in charge. On searching him two tins of tobacco, 2 oranges, 2 bananas and several cigars were found on his person. After arrest he cursed and swore at Mr. Kennedy for leaving his premises open as a temptation to him. The prisoner was remanded for trial in the Supreme Court.

We had the pleasure of attending the first entertainment given by the Louise Leighton Opera Company, on Saturday evening, and must say that it is seldom that Charlottetown is favored with such a rich musical treat by a travelling company. The rendition of "Pinafore" was, we think, as near the style in which Gilbert and Sullivan intended it should be rendered, as it is possible for a travelling troupe to accomplish. The singing of those who took the parts of Josephine, Ralph Raekstraw and Captain Corcoran was very fine indeed. We think that Mr. Eckert as "Ralph" is the best tenor singer that ever performed here. Unlike the last company that was here, the "Louise Leighton" Company did not omit a single song or part that was set down in the original opera, and it is needless to say that "Pinafore," without vocalistic talent and with some of the best songs and choruses omitted is—as Artemas Ward would say—"like the play of Othello, with the part of 'Othello' left out." Our readers, however, can rely on having the whole opera on visiting the "Louise Leighton" Company this evening.

The members of the police force were inspected by the Stipendiary Magistrate to-day in the presence of his Worship the Mayor and representatives of the Patriot and EXAMINER. The men appeared shabbily clad, and the seedy appearance of their clothing was sharply criticised by the Magistrate and His Worship. With the exception of one, whom His Honor styled the "swell of the force"—officer Heartz, perhaps—the officers required new coats, and with the exception of the Bailiff, who had just made a purchase, they all required new hats. Several of the officers intimated that they recently left orders for clothing, which would be supplied in a few days. After a few remarks on the style of the new clothing, the inspection, as regards wearing apparel, was over, and that of duty was commenced. Among other things, the Marshal informed His Worship and His Honor that the officers had been busily engaged seeking the names of owners of unlawful curs within the city limits, and that a complete list of the owners of such curs was now in the hands of City Clerk. They had also inspected the numerous yards in the city, and gave orders for the removal of nuisances. The Magistrate then instructed them to make a second inspection of the yards immediately—as many filthy ones had been complained of—and if they were not thoroughly cleaned, and instantly summon their occupiers. He also instructed the officers to disarm all mischievous boys who carried pop guns and set off fire-crackers. He then discharged the men with an advice to be attentive to duty during the ensuing month.
