SHEEP FOR THE UNITED STATES.—On Wednesday, 206 sheep from Prince Edward Island were sent over the St. John & Maine Railway to Bangor. The refrigerator cars which run daily on this railway are filled with mutton and lamb for the Bangor and Boston markets, where Canadian mutton is very popular.—St. John Telegraph.

DEATH FROM STARVATION.—Mr. William Estey, of Durham Settlement, York county, whom we stated in last issue was gradually dying from starvation, caused by the closing of the lower third of the meat tube leading from the mouth to the stomach, died on Saturday morning. He had not eaten or drunk food of any kind for forty days.—Fredericton Reporter.

A PROMINENT Government official in the Weights and Measures Department in Montreal has become a heavy defaulter, and has absconded to the States. It is alleged he defrauded a number of his subordinates by issuing ante-dated cheques and getting them to raise the amount from brokers and give it to him as a temporary loan. He is said to be heavily in debt in the city. He is well connected, and stood very high in the esteem of his friends.

BURGLARY.—During the past month numerous robberies have been committed in the city by a gang of young thieves, which we are pleased to learn has been broken up by the police, and the ringleaders have been arrested. There are some of the said gang at large yet; and on Saturday night they entered the residence of Mr. Thomas Green, Douglass Street. The robbers upset the furniture generally and left, no doubt, with some valuable articles, which up to the present have not been missed. By the way, a citizen complains that the appearance of a policeman on Douglass Street and vicinity is an unusual phenomenon.

ROSA DONAHUE and her little son, Eddie, aged two years, were precipitated through the Intercolonial wharf at York Point, St. John, on Friday last, by the breaking of a plank, into the water beneath and drowned. No one else was on the wharf at the time, but some boys near by heard the splash and gave the alarm. John Howe and John Harding, Jr., took a boat to the scene and grappled through the open face of the wharf for the bodies. At the third attempt they brought up Rosa Donahue's corpse; but it was not until 4.45 p. m. that they succeeded in recovering the remains of the child. The sad accident called forth a general feeling of sympathy and crowds visited the spot during the day.—Sun.

A THEATRICAL FRAUD.—"Violet Campbell's Great Theatre Company," which performed in Caledonia Hall on Thursday night, was the greatest fraud that ever visited Cape Breton. The "male stars" were the biggest green-horns that ever appeared on a stage, and seemed as much out of place as "bulls in china shops." Miss Violet, the head of this theatrical troupe, decamped in a schooner for St. John's, Newfoundland, on Sunday night or Monday morning, leaving all the debts contracted by her troupe unpaid. Naturally enough, the "stars," or green-horns rather, left behind were waited upon by landlords, livery-stable keepers and others, who threatened legal proceedings. These members of the troupe promised to settle their bills with the proceeds of an entertainment they intended giving at Sydney Mines on Monday evening. That evening a fair audience gathered in the Temperance Hall in response to posters, and the "stars" appeared on the stage, but did not, and could not, perform, and were properly treated to a few dozen rotten eggs, after being compelled to refund the admission money.—North Sydney Herald.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN. OTTAWA, Aug. 26. McDonald, the Ottawa oarsman, is anxious to row McKay, of Halifax, if the latter will issue a challenge and make the necessary deposit, the race to take place at Halifax. He has spoken of the matter several times since the first announcement on the subject was made. As the result of the coming into force of the new Ontario Judicature Act this week, there is considerable confusion in the courts, and not a little dissatisfaction among lawyers.

UNITED STATES. WASHINGTON, Aug. 26. Executive Mansion, 7.30 p. m.—There is no material change in the condition of the President since the last official bulletin. Dr. Hamilton thinks the patient to-night is a shade better. Unofficial—Executive Mansion, 11 p. m.—There has been no report from the surgeons room of any change in the President's condition since 10 o'clock.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26. At the union meeting of prayer for the recovery of the President, held to-day, at Vermont Avenue Christian Church, it was agreed by the pastor present that a recommendation be made to their churches to observe Sunday, the 28th instant, as a day of humiliation and prayer, and that an invitation be extended to the sister churches of this city, and as far as possible throughout the country, to unite in the observance. The recommendations meet with the approval of the President's family.

LONDON, Aug. 26. It is stated that the Queen expressed deep regret on learning of the relapse of President Garfield and that her Majesty renewed her request for the latest telegrams concerning his condition.

LEXINGTON, Mo., Aug. 26. An omnibus which was conveying passengers from the Washash railroad to Lexington, about eight o'clock last evening, was entered by four heavily armed men who robbed the five passengers of their money, watches and other valuables and then escaped. A posse is in pursuit of the robbers.

NEW YORK, Aug. 26. The Evening Post's morning special from Washington says those who have followed the condition of the President through the night say that no incident of note marked the progress of the hours. He was evidently sinking, and all reasonable hope has disappeared. Dr. Reynolds said early this morning that he had seen no grounds for renewed hope from the patient's condition. During the night his pulse had been up to 110 most of the time. He did not think the President would die to-day.

EUROPEAN. LONDON, Aug. 26. The Vice-Roy of India telegraphs:—"Reinforcement of Amers infantry and cavalry at Khetat Ghilzai, from Cabul." The war office has entertained a request for the employment of a cavalry regiment at the Cape, after the reduction of the British Garrison in South Africa, as a measure of precaution. DUBLIN, Aug. 20. Mr. Forster, Chief Secretary for Ireland, went to London on Thursday, and will start on Saturday for Switzerland, whence he returns about 16th September.

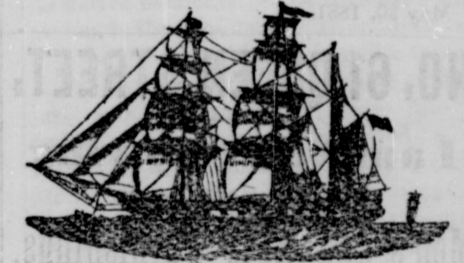
