## Acting Premier Has No Comment

"No comment," was the terse reply of Hon. J. D. Stewart, acting premier, Saturday morning when asked to make a statement regarding the possibility of the province facing a commission government.

Mr. Stewart said the government could not continue plugging up debt as it was doing and predicted the island would be under a commission government within five years, 10 years at the most.

## DOG SURVIVES LONELY ORDEAL

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y. (AP) — A large collie dog, gaunt with hunger, is safe after spending at least 10 lonely days trapped on a ledge in the 300-foot-deep deep below Niagara River gorge.

The dog, whose barking drew attention about 11 days ago, apparently fell to the ledge which is 100 feet from the wharf and about three miles north of the falls.

He was finally spotted late Friday and police were called into action. They could not reach him Friday night, but resumed their efforts Saturday.

Sergeant James Rogers and Patrolman Joseph P. Boett climbed down the treacherous incline.

The frightened dog fought with the officers briefly and allowed himself to be carried out.

Police said the dog's identification tag apparently was lost in the fall, they called the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals to help him with shelter where he hunted for the owners.

## Craft Are Identified As North Vietnamese

NEW YORK (AP) — State Secretary Dean Rusk said Sunday night the PT boats which attacked the U.S. Navy destroyer Maddox in the Tonkin Gulf Sunday were North Vietnamese.

"The other side got it going out of this," Rusk told a reporter. "If they do it again, they'll get another stang."

He identified "the other side" as the North Vietnamese. Rusk said the United States is "going to use and insist upon using international waters."

The three unidentified PT boats attacked the U.S. Navy destroyer Maddox off the coast of Communist North Viet Nam Sunday. The Maddox and four carrier planes returned the fire.

ADVISERS CALLED IN President Johnson called in high-level diplomatic and military advisers presumably to discuss the incident.

A spokesman said the destroyer was not damaged and none of the crew were hurt and officers were hurt. The Maddox is flagship of the U.S. 7th Fleet's Destroyer Division 195.

Time of the attack was given as 4:08 a.m. EDT.

It was reported by a 20-millimeter fire and three torpedoes, was unprovoked and occurred in international waters off the Tonkin Gulf, about 80 miles south-east of Hanoi and 30 miles off the coast of North Vietnam.

Fire from the unmarked pat torpedo boats was returned by the destroyer's 4-inch gun and 20-millimeter straffing gun rocket attacks from four F4U Corsair fighters from the carrier Ticonderoga, a Navy spokesman said.

THREE BOATS DAMAGED The destroyer's fire badly damaged the three boats, the report said, and at least one of them was left powerless and floating helplessly.

LEOPOLDVILLE (AP)—Charged with a witch-doctor, Communist-backed guerrilla warriors have driven legal government forces from the Congo. They threaten to split the former Belgian colony into the Congo's North and South.

Each new day brings frightening news to Leopoldville, capital of Premier Moise Tshombe's reconciliation government.

Tshombe was given delirious welcomes even in the rebel-held areas. He is held responsible for the 1961 murder of leftist Patrick Lumumba, the Congo's first prime minister.

Tshombe claims Communist Chinese diplomats in Africa are helping the rebels. He summoned the foreign diplomatic corps in Leopoldville Saturday and showed them what he called evidence that Peking was behind the uprisings. The evidence included a 76-page Communist leader Mao Tse-tung's letter.

But Tshombe's biggest headache is the army's born of the July 1960 mutiny which sent the country into a state of lawlessness and chaos for seven days after independence.

The soldiers are in a race against time. Scarcely three weeks after taking office, he must find a way to get the country back to the country's collapse into anarchy.

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## Scots Get Home Late And Angry

PRESTWICK (Reuters)—One hundred and nine weary, angry Scots landed here 24 hours late Saturday, after the Canadian Air Transport Board refused to let their chartered aircraft land in Toronto to take them home.

An ATB spokesman said the airline concerned, United States Airways, failed to comply with the board's request for documentation showing it to be a certified commercial carrier in the U.S.

The Scots, visiting relatives in Canada, had to hire an Air Canada jet at extra expense to bring them from Toronto.

Their trip to Canada was also delayed, when their chartered U.S. Airways plane was held up on an earlier flight from Florida. The passengers had to hire a BOAC plane at further extra cost.

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## British Police Quell Teen-Age Mobs

HASTINGS (CP) — Britain's first airborne police squad went into action against two feuding teen-age groups Sunday and a day of sporadic violence ended with three policemen injured and at least 25 young persons arrested.

Thousands of yelling mobs marched through the south coast resort in late evening hours, clashing with four police officers. The mobs began to disperse as the sun set, but gradually faded out.

At a special court Sunday, 14 youths were ordered held in custody for trial on charges of rioting and obstruction of police.
