S'side Man Gets Two Years In Dorchester At Request

SUMMERSIDE — An aversion to doing time in Prince County jail cost Eric Gallant of Summerside an extra year in custody when he was sentenced in police court yesterday for "patter" to use a forged check as though it was genuine.

After Magistrate R.S. Hinton, QC, sentenced Gallant to one year in Prince County jail, the accused expressed his disapproval by saying he would rather serve two years in Dorchester penitentiary than be incarcerated locally for one year on the grounds the jail is "filthy".

The magistrate complied. This was Gallant's second offence of a similar nature.

The magistrate told Gallant he hoped he would learn a trade at the penitentiary and return to society a better citizen.

Resorts Asked To Pay Exchange To Tourists

Considerable apprehension regarding tourist reaction to failure to obtain full exchange rates on United States dollars was voiced by directors of the F.E.I. Tourist Association at a special meeting held at the Charlottetown Hotel Tuesday.

R. Gordon Shaw, president, presided.

It was agreed to urge all members of the association to pay the full prevailing rate as one of the best means of creating goodwill among visitors.

The directors noted a discrepancy in payments of exchange in various areas and stated that tourists had started to do so. They did not receive any exchange whatever as their U.S. dollars spent at the liquor vendors either here or in Summerside.

They asked that all tourist resort operators, hotel keepers, service stations and other businesses do everything to assure the visitor of fair treatment.

The association also reached a decision to place the welcoming pier at the intersection of Albany, near the tourist information boxes rather than on the pier at Borden. Difficulties regarding both traffic and sound were noted so far as the pier is concerned and the directors were unanimous in approving the change.

It was stated no traffic problem exists at Albany due to parking area for those wishing to stop and hear the music of the highlands.
