Debt Problem Discussed In House By Mr. Saville

The only way to give the public the services for which they are clamoring is to go in debt or increase taxation, said Mr. George E. Saville, Fifth Kings, when he resumed his part in the debate on the Budget last night in the Legislature.

He was extremely critical of the Federation of Agriculture for not confining their activities to agriculture instead of venturing into the field of political economy. He said they had a research man in Europe last year when they should have him on agriculture, particularly on soil erosion, which was becoming a serious problem.

The speaker said he had received a letter asking why he expressed the opinion that articles by Mr. Len McIsaac were a "blueprint for a totalitarian state" when the country would still have a Parliament. Mr. Saville said that Hitler and Mussolini had said the same thing once.

He thought that outside of the Minister of Public Works no other Minister had a better chance to earn his salary through keeping down expenses than the Minister of Health and Welfare because there were so many people looking for relief. He was also appreciative of the great work of the Department of Industry in aiding farmers in stumping and leveling land.

Regarding the operation of the M.V. Eskimo he said the intentions of the Government were good and despite the reported deficit he was not sure but what the advertising resulting from her operation did the Province a lot of good.

Paraplegics Embark On Magazine Sub. Project

To prove that they have the initiative and know-how to operate a business of their own, paraplegics have recently started the Paraplegic Magazine Subscription Agency, represented in P. E. I. by Miss Nora McLean, Souris. The agency now consists of approximately 35 members who cover Quebec district and eastern Canada.

The idea is simple: It's merely a plan to provide work for disabled people. Any person who subscribes to any one of some 3200 publications, can now enter his or her subscription through the Paraplegic Magazine Subscription Agency.

The agency is affiliated with the Wm. Barber Magazine Agency, a firm with some thirty years experience in the field. This permits the paraplegics to offer the public the services of a well-established company.

Harold Kelley, a war-disabled paraplegic, has been selected to coordinate the project.

Harry Ward, secretary-treasurer of the Quebec Division, Canadian Paraplegic Association, says that the purpose of the new magazine subscription agency "is to provide work for disabled people. We, in the Paraplegic Association, are continually looking for work suitable for our handicapped members, particularly those who are confined to wheel-chairs. When this idea of paraplegics selling

magazines arose, it was the answer, we thought, to the problem of providing work for many of our members. It could be carried out even in the smaller communities where it is almost impossible to get employment for them.

"It is our hope," Mr. Ward said, "that in time we will be able to establish in the minds of the public across Canada the habit of buying magazines through these persons."

The boys will be investigated next week in a special ceremony. The evening was spent in test passing and games, and closed with the council rock. Death Yesterday Of Mr. George MacLure Murray Hbr. North

The death occurred last evening in the King's County Hospital, Montague, after a lengthy illness of Mr. George MacLure, of Murray Harbour North, in his 71st year. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Carney MacLure, of Murray Harbour North. His wife, the former Emma Dalziel of Murray Harbour, predeceased him a number of years ago.

He leaves to mourn his passing three sons, Preston in Goose Bay, Labrador; Hazen and James, of Murray Harbour North, and one daughter, Eileen, Mrs. William Graham, Gasperaux.

Also surviving are five brothers, Charles, Adam, Chester, Benjamin, and Howard, all of Montague, and one sister, Belle, of Boston, Mass., U. S. A.

The funeral arrangements were not completed at time of writing.

2nd King's Requirements Stressed By Mr. Cullen

Taking his own seat in the House as a member from Second Kings, Mr. Thomas E. Cullen, Clerk of the House, took part in debate yesterday for the first time this session.

He offered both congratulations and commiserations to the Speaker. He said he fully knew the onerous duties involved as he held the post himself. He briefly referred to Draft address speakers' references to the late King and their hopes for the new Queen. He hoped that many of the things which had held in the time of the first Queen Elizabeth would not be in evidence in this reign. He spoke of the life of the Elizabethan times as being so clearly depicted in the novels of Sir Walter Scott.

Noting that it was the duty of private members to uphold the Government he declared it was not necessary this session as the Opposition was so mild they were doing the duty of the private members.

On Health and Welfare he noted the tremendous growth in this phase of Government work and compared it to the years at the start of the First World War when the Government used to send amounts of about \$140 to the clergymen in the districts to be distributed among the deserving poor. He compared this with the vast spending program now undertaken. He remarked that some people expressed doubt that we might be "going overboard" in spending on this department, but asked, "Can anyone here put a price on the health or even the lives of our people?" He said that some of the divisions of the department which had been un-

der review were necessary as Ottawa required them and they were brought into being in order that we might qualify for the Federal grants.

Hospital Grants
He was glad to note the increased grants to hospitals and wondered if possibly now the hospitals might be able to pay their student nurses a bit more money than at present. They received very little at present and he thought that had a deterring effect on girls entering the profession. He was asked by the Minister if he thought that would help the situation and Mr. Cullen said that it would greatly help. The girls had to pay for breakage and if it was serious the girl would receive very little at the end of the month. One girl he stated received only 35 cents for her month's work.

He thought another deterrent to girls entering nursing was the high standard of education required here. It was not so high in Nova Scotia and some girls were going to Halifax to train. Hon. Mr. Matheson said our standards were high to permit the girls to take post-graduate work at a university.

The speaker noted that the Government no longer gave any assistance to rural telephone lines though at one time they gave grants to help build them. Present rural companies needed help. He knew it was too late now to vote any money but there were amounts voted for in Agriculture and industry departments which might be switched.

He approved the work of the Department of Industry and Natural Resources for its work in land drainage and clearance.

Revenue Problem

He agreed with other speakers that we could not keep going in debt forever. We might save a little by "cheese paring", but he thought the only answer was to find additional sources of revenue somewhere.

The member from Annapolis admitted he was surprised at the amount spent on roads last year. He had expected that due to the late season there would not be so much work done as in other years but the figures were high. He was not charging waste but he thought the Government could build roads cheaper with their own machinery than by contract. He suggested that the Government should be careful in its selection of road supervisors as some of the roads were costing too much. In his own district they were building better roads cheaper.

He thought one of the reasons

Highway Work

But he did think since the highway was entirely in Queens County that Kings and Prince should get something as compensation. He also thought since the highway was not coming into the city that the Government should take one of the main entrances to the city from the highway and put in a good pavement all the way.

He said this is the capital of P. E. I. and the more work the city has to do on the streets the higher taxes have to be and that meant a higher cost of living. He suggested that since the Government had so many employees living here, it should spend less on salaries and put some into making a street to keep city costs down. He was asked "What about Summerside" and replied "Summerside can look after itself."

Snow fighting with plows imposed a heavy strain on the equipment and he felt the work could be done much better with a bulldozer and maintained following and criticism of the policy in schools, he remarked that if the Province turned out as many brilliant men in the next 50 years as they had in the past the educational system would be alright. He mentioned several of the men who had gone from here to become famous.

He was not worried about the decline in population here as the great Greek states of the past had never been very large.

He thought that one day Prince Edward Island could be "The Greece of North America".

It is a good place to live and good men were returning to their former homes. After all there is more in this world than dollars and cents. A man can only eat so much in a day and he can only sleep in one bed."
