Religious.

Twenty-two Mormon missionaries sailed for Europe last week in search of converts. One was robbed of \$140 by an unknown thief.

Great preparations are being made at Assisi, in Italy, to celebrate this winter the seventh centenary of the birth of St. Francis, the founder of the Franciscan order of monks.

This has been a good year, it seems, for the British Methodist Churches. In Zion's Herald the following enumeration of gains is given: Wesleyan Methodist, 12,674; Primitive Methodist, 5,978; Bible Christians, about 2,000; Methodist Free Churches, about 1,200; Methodist New Connexion, 851; total increase in England, 22,713.

The Bishop of Winchester, addressing his Diocesan Conference, said: "At present no Church has ever had such a body of educated, intelligent gentlemen among its clergy; but we want something else. We find that bad taste reaches the masses when good taste won't. We want something of the nature of a peasant ministry."

Miller," and the other "ex-Judge Wilson," and their pretended errand was to interest Mr. Livengood in Wilson's candidacy for Congress.

"I am deep in grief," he wrote "that you had not loyal or courage enough to save you from the wretched fall you contemplate." "We are deeply grieved," adds the London Echo, which tells the story, "that the Bishop had not sense enough to save himself from this wretched exhibition of bigotry."
