The Bonavista arrived in port from Montreal at 10.30 Thursday evening, and sailed at noon yesterday for Souris, St. John's, Nfld., and Sydney with a large cargo of live stock and produce, including seventy eight head of cattle, ninety eight sheep, two horses, twelve hundred bags oats, nine hundred bags potatoes, twenty five tons hay, eighty packages butter, and sundry other cargo.

Yesterday morning the City was visited with two fires. The first one was rung in at 9.45 for a blaze in a house on Eochford St. occupied by Benjamin Binns and family. After half an hour's work this blaze was extinguished. At ten, ten another alarm sounded, this time for a fire in house on Cumberland St. occupied by Richard Power.
