**Ottawa Rough Riders To Enter Playoff Finals**

OTTAWA (CP)—Rookie import end Ted Watkins scored the only two touchdowns of the game—both on passing plays—when Ottawa Rough Riders made their way to the Eastern Football Conference finals for the first time in three years Saturday by whipping Montreal Alouettes 17-3 here.

Watkins, acquired by Riders this season to fill the offensive hole left by the retirement of Bobby Simpson, hauled in a 20-yard pass from quarterback Russ Jackson in the second quarter for his first touchdown. In the fourth quarter when Alouettes were threatening to wipe out the lead built up by Riders, Watkins worked his way into the clear in the Montreal end zone and grabbed a 40-yard touchdown pass for the clinching points.

The touchdowns were Watkins' first in Canadian football. Riders and Hamilton Tiger-Cats begin a two-game, total-points-totient series here next Saturday, the winner to meet the western champion in the Grey Cup game.

Tackle Moe Racine booted a field goal and a single, and half back Rick Black converted one of Watkins' touchdowns for the other Ottawa points.

Gino Berretta kicked a field goal and a single for Alouettes, and Fred Burket completed the

Montreal scoring with a single off a quick-kick. Turning point of the game came midway through the fourth quarter with Riders clinging to a 10-3 lead. Alouettes had the ball on the Montreal 43, third down and two yards to go. They gambled. Instead of kicking they tried for a first down. Halfback George Dixon took quarterback Warren Rabb's pass but was pulled down behind the line of scrimmage, giving Ottawa possession on the Montreal 41.

At the time two players from each team were serving penalties as a result of a wild free-for-all late in the third period that climaxed a rough and tumble contest. Referee John Ashley handed out 21 minor penalties, five majors and two 10-minute misconducts.

Veteran centre Red Kelly scored twice for Leafs, one on a deflection of a Tim Horton slapshot in the first period and the other on a low drive from the point during a third-period power play.

Leaf captain George Armstrong scored his sixth goal of the season on a well-executed solo rush in the first period. Other Chicago scorers were Jack McKenzie and Chico Maki.
